Bright Steelhead Move Up River

Portland —(U.P.)— The weekly report on fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

SOUTHWEST: Silvers and jack salmon being taken in Tenmile lakes. An occasional steelhead is now being picked up on the south and north forks of the Coquille river and on the west fork of the Millicoma river. Angling slow in south coastal streams.

A few bright steelhead moved up onto the Galice and Robertson bridge area of the Rogue river just prior to the cold spell, but few fish were taken before water temperatures dropped.

Angling is very slow throughout the upper Umpqua river area.

Rote Credits Conerly for Pass Feats

Kyle Rote, a modest Texan who first gained football fame at Southern Methodist, claims his pass-catching feats for the New York Giants this year are based on Charlie Conerly's throwing ability.

Rote has made catches off his shoe strings. He has twisted and caught balls thrown behind him. He set up a touchdown last Sunday by grabbing a pass while Jesse Thomas of the Baltimore Colts virtually was riding him "piggy-back."

But the 27-year-old San Antonio blond says Conerly is mainly responsible for 22 catches that have gained 452 yards, better than 20 yards per catch, and five touchdowns.

"When I go out and make my fake, he seems to know where I'm going and puts the ball right there," Rote said.

Halfback at SMU

Rote first made a football reputation playing halfback for SMU but the Giants have few good offensive ends this season and Rote frequently has been asked to play that unfamiliar position.

Rote's catching ability will be one of New York's chief offensive threats against the Philadelphia Eagles at the Polo Grounds in one of Sunday's six National Football League games. The Giants (3-5) are picked to defeat the Eagles (3-4-1).

The other selections with worst-loss records in parentheses: Lions (2-6) over Chicago Bears (5-3) at Detroit; Los Angeles Rams (5-3) over Colts (4-4) at Baltimore; Green Bay Packers (4-4) over San Francisco Forty-Niners (3-5) at Green Bay; Browns (6-2) over Pittsburgh Steelers (4-4) at Cleveland; Cardinals (3-4-1) over Washington Redskins (5-3) at Chicago.
