Ivan E. Tyrrell, a former resident of Jackson county, died Nov. 9 at his home in Rainier, Ore.

He was born July 9, 1889 near Lake Creek, the son of pioneer parents, the late John H. and Arlette Tyrrell. He spent his early years at the family home and attended school in Medford. At one time, he was engaged in the restaurant business here.

In 1910, Mr. Tyrrell went to Rainier, where he married Hester Thwing, who survives. For 35 years, he owned and operated a barber shop in Rainier, retiring 10 years ago because of failing health.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two brothers, John R. Tyrrell, Lake Creek, and Arden M. Tyrrell, Rogue River, and by several nieces and a nephew. Funeral services were held Nov. 12 in the Rainier Methodist church with the Rev. Raymond Otto officiating. Ritualistic services were conducted by the Rainier Masonic lodge.

Vault entombment was in Rainier Green Mountain cemetery.
