## Plenty of Drama in Grid Battle Between Beavers - Webfoots

Eugene—(U.P.)—Drama aplenty will unfold on Hayward field in Eugene tomorrow when Oregon and Oregon State meet for the 59th time in football.

Leading the Oregon team into action will be Lon Stiner Jr., tackle and captain, who is playing his final game for the Webfoots. Stiner's dad was the coach at Oregon State for years but his son chose the Eugene school.

### Muddy Field In Prospect At Eugene

Oregon State will be all out to win, not only for Coach Tommy Prothro who is being boomed for "Coach of the Year" honors at Corvallis, but for the Pacific Coast Conference title. A win would wrap up the best OSC season since the Rose Bowl team of 1941.

Also playing his final game will be Dick James, the hard-hitting halfback from Grants Pass who played in the shadow of quarterback George Shaw for two seasons but now is ranked by some along with such Oregon halfbacks as Mark Temple, George Bell, Woodley Lewis, Tom Roblin, Curt Meacham, Jay Graybeal, Bob Smith and many more.

Oregon has beaten Oregon State only five times in the last 20 years but holds an over-all 28 to 21 advantage. Seven games have ended in ties.

Oregon will have added incentive to win for Coach Len Casanova who was hanged in effigy this week and later was hospitalized with possible appendicitis. Cas' will be able to see the game but his physician said "only in an observatory manner."

**Last Game For Many**  
Ron Siegrist, the OSC signal caller and co-captain, was wounded slightly by a shotgun blast while duck-hunting, but still hopes to play.

Seniors making their final appearance for OSC include co-

captain Howard Buettgenbach, Siegrist, Arlo Wenstrand, Larry Stevens, Andy Skief, Bob Riggert, Dick Mason and Frank Negri.

Appearing in their final game for Oregon besides James and Stiner will be Art Weber, Jim Potter, and Harry Johnson.

### Muddy Field In Prospect At Eugene

Eugene—(U.P.)—A muddy field is in prospect here tomorrow where Oregon and Oregon State collide for the 59th time in the West's oldest football rivalry with a possible PCC title riding on the outcome.

Ground crews began removing snow from Hayward field with light tractors yesterday and then planned to use brushes to avoid damage. But the big thaw moved in today and coupled with rain and possibility of more tomorrow, the chances of goey going were heightened.

**Secret Drills**  
Both teams moved away from normal practice areas yesterday because of the weather. Oregon worked out at the Lane county fairgrounds and Oregon State worked indoors in the college armory.

Both workouts were in secret. Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers can finish ahead of UCLA atop the PCC standings should they knock off Oregon and UCLA be upset by Southern California.

The game is considered a toss-up. Oddsmakers in the east made Oregon a one-point favorite. But wet going would hamper both Oregon's speed and Oregon State has shown more effective passing so far.

Lunch will be available at the grounds and the shoot is open to the public. Turkeys and bacon will be prizes.

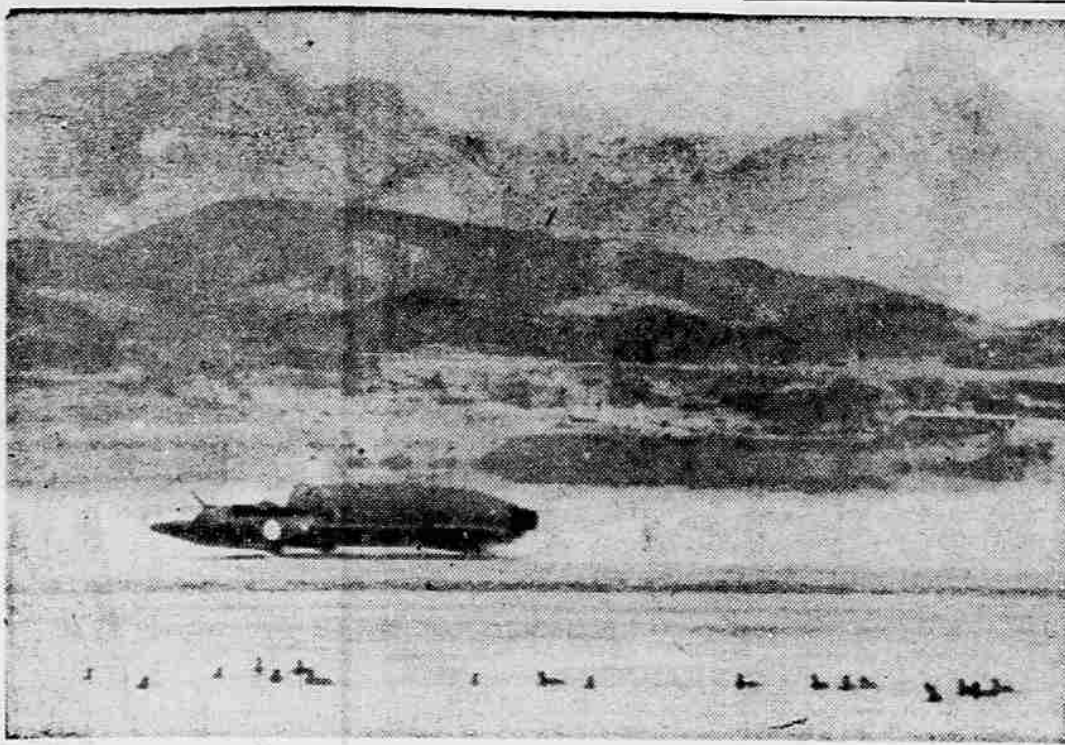

## Wes Santee Will Appeal Suspension

Kansas City, Mo.—(U.P.)—America's fastest miler will appeal his permanent suspension from AAU sponsored track events here Sunday.

Wes Santee, former University of Kansas ace who has come within a whisker of the four-minute mile on several occasions, will appear in person before the Missouri Valley AAU board of managers if he can find transportation here from his Marine base at Quantico, Va.

Santee's suspension over expenses for his participation in three California track meets last May could wreck his chances to run in the Olympics in Australia next year.

**Can Go To National**  
If the appeal to the Missouri Valley AAU fails, Santee can appeal to the national AAU at its convention in Louisville, Ky., Dec. 1-4.

Lined up behind the Ashland, Kan., runner were Santee's former coach, Bill Easton of Kansas University, and Sen. Frank Carlson (R-Kan.). Easton termed the suspension of the cocky star "not a very fair and sportsmanlike proposition," and charged the AAU brought the rule "out of hiding" in the Santee case. He said the circumstances in the Kansas miler's case were not different from "thousands of others" involving top athletes. He blamed track

meet promoters for part of the difficulty.

### WHITE JOINING TROUPE

Boston—(U.P.)—Sammy White, Boston Red Sox catcher, will join a troupe of entertainers on Nov. 24 on an Army-sponsored tour of American bases and hospitals in Europe and North Africa. White is the only athlete in the troupe.

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Columbia, S. C.—(U.P.)—The University of South Carolina will meet Duke, Miami, Maryland and Clemson among others in football next year. The Gamecocks, who have won only two of eight games thus far this year, will play seven Atlantic Coast Conference schools in 1956 beginning with Duke.
