

Fans Given Grid Info on Army, Navy

New York — (U.P.) — If you still haven't made up your mind whether you like Army or Navy in the big game, here's some information that might help you decide:

Army has the stronger defense. As a matter of fact, the Cadets have the finest defense of any major college football team in the country. But Navy is right up close in the No. 2 spot.

The Black Knights of West Point lead the nation in total defense with an average yield of 139.5 yards per game. They have yielded only 1.116 yards in eight games this season, according to the NCAA Service Bureau.

Navy, which has the traditional date with Army in Philadelphia, Nov. 26, has given up an average of 169 yards per game, having yielded a total of 1,352 yards in eight games. Maryland ranks third in total defense with an average of 174.7 yards in nine games while Auburn is fourth with a 181.5 average and Holy Cross fifth with 186.5.

Cadets Top Rushing

The Cadets also head the rushing defense department. They have given up only 578 yards on the ground for an average of 72.3 yards per game. Navy ranks no better than eighth in this category with a 120.6 average.

Maryland follows Army in rushing defense with a 76.7 figure while Holy Cross is third with 92.9, Auburn fourth with 103.0 and Oklahoma fifth with 110.1.

Navy, which had the best pass defense average in the country until Columbia completed 18 out of 33 attempts for 161 yards Saturday, dropped to fourth spot in that department this week. Florida took over the lead with an average of 43.8 yards yielded through the air, followed by George Washington with 45.0 and Nebraska with 45.6. Navy has now given up an average of 48.4 yards per game through the air.

Michigan State leads in punting with a kick of 42.1 yards. Tennessee is second with 41.7 and Mississippi third with 39.7.

'Big Games Bring Back Past Events

San Francisco — (U.P.) — The ghosts of some memorable moments will return to the big league stadium up and down the West Coast tomorrow.

When the teams pair off for their annual clashes, the memories of such names as Howard Maple of Oregon State, Gene Cook of Washington, Shy Huntington of Oregon, Kenny Washington of UCLA and Pesky Sprott of California, to name a few, will be flitting through the air.

For tomorrow is the "big game"—the day of the traditional rivalries for the Pacific Coast Conference.

Some of the old-timers, the young old-timers and some of a more recent vintage, will remember these years:

1900—Football's biggest disaster. Stanford defeated California, 5-0, but the thrill was lost when 23 spectators standing on the roof of a glass works nearby to watch the game were killed when the roof collapsed and they fell into vats of molten glass.

1907 — Oregon State, which went through the year unscathed, was barely able to squeak by Oregon, 4-0, and Washington State handed Washington an 11-5 beating—the last time the Huskies were to lose for nine years.

Huntington Kicked

1914—Shy Huntington kicked a 35-yard field goal to give Oregon a 3-3 tie with the Beavers.

1918 — Oregon's first team played the full game without a substitution in beating Oregon State, 13-6. The Ducks played three games that year without making a substitution.

1926 — Eugene Cook place-kicked 40 and 45-yard field goals for Washington, but Washington State won, 9-6.

1927—Biff Hoffman scored on the hidden ball play to lead Stanford to a 13-6 win over California; and Howard Maple of Oregon State returned a punt 80 yards for a touchdown as the Beavers won, 21-7.

1937 — Kenny Washington passed 62 yards to Harold Hirsch for a UCLA score, but Southern California won, 19-13.

1939 — Southern California's great defense held Washington without gain three times inside the four-yard line and the Trojans played a 0-0 tie with UCLA to gain the Rose Bowl berth.

1947 — Jackie Jensen passed and Paul Keckley received and ran on an 80-yard play in the waning seconds of the game to give California a 21-18 win over Stanford.

1953—Cal and Stanford battled to a 21-21 tie in what many consider the greatest of all clashes in the 58-year-old rivalry.

Quarter-Million Expected To Witness Traditional Gridiron Frays on Coast

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Come rain, snow or high water, more than 250,000, one quarter of a million, mind you fans, will turn out for football games involving Pacific Coast Conference teams on Saturday.

Not because there is anything of major importance at stake—but because of a little item called tradition.

The oldest game is at Eugene, Ore., where Oregon and Oregon State tangle for the 59th time. They'll have 25,000 in the stands.

Then comes California vs. Stanford, meeting for the 57th conflict before 90,000 at Stanford.

Of course, Washington and Washington State will be at it for the 48th time before about 35,000.

Bruins vs. Trojans

And then, among the Johnny-come-latelys, Southern California tangles with UCLA for the 25th time before 101,000 in the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Idaho, the "half-sister" in the conference, steps outside the loop competition for its traditional foe, Montana University, for the 39th time, before about 10,000 fans at Moscow.

UCLA already has clinched a tie for the PCC championship—even if it loses to Southern California. On top of that, Coach Red Sanders' club must be considered a cinch to go to the Rose Bowl. The Bruins and their Sam

(First Down) Brown have lost only one game this year—to Maryland. They are 10-point favorites to beat the Trojans and if they do they will have undisputed possession of the PCC title for the second year in a row.

Beavers vs. Ducks

Oregon State has a chance to tie for the crown by beating Oregon, but UCLA already has trounced the Beavers and the Bruins appear the logical choice for the Rose Bowl bid. Southern California would have to upset UCLA to give the Beavers a share in the title.

California, suffering from its worst season in eight years, will be trying to keep a victory string intact against Stanford. The Golden Bears haven't lost a game to the Indians since Pappy Waldorf came to Strawberry Canyon.

Washington is a 15-point favorite to whip a Washington State team that has won only one game all year, while tying two others.

Idaho, winner of only one contest all season, should beat the Montana club that is playing in a slightly lower classification.

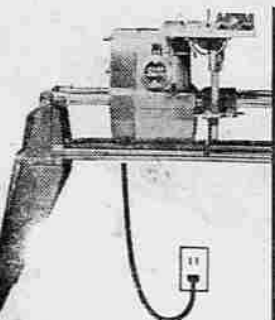
INJURIES FATAL

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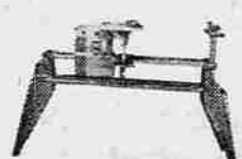
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
