Spanish Teaching Workshop Success

Ashland — Reactions to the experimental workshop on "Teaching Spanish in the Elementary Schools" conducted by Southern Oregon college personnel last summer have been pronounced most satisfactory by Dennis Hannan, assistant professor of languages at the college and director of the program.

Returns from student evaluation sheets, comments of the administration, faculty, and community have been gratifying according to Hannan, who also pointed out that a few teachers in the first six grades and one school superintendent are now planning to teach Spanish in their classes.

Academically, Hannan explained, the true significance of these results indicates the feasibility of setting up introductory foreign language workshops in small colleges concerned with teacher education at the elementary level.

The deceased was born Sept. 10, 1890, in Wisconsin. On Sept. 13, 1940, in Grangeville, Ida., he married Clara V. Hoke, who survives.

Other survivors include a son, Robert Munhall, Seattle, Wash.; two daughters, Mrs. Don Crimmin, Portland, Ore., and Mrs. Robert Hamilton, Seattle; a brother, H. T. Smith, Malta, Mont.; a sister, Mrs. Helen Woster, Yakima, Wash., and seven grandchildren.

MARSHALL BALDWIN
Ashland — Marshal L. Baldwin, member of a pioneer Oregon family, died here Thursday at the age of 81.

Born Aug. 9, 1874 at Williams, Ore., the deceased was the youngest son of Judge Marshall F. and Eliza Anne Baldwin. Judge Baldwin was Josephine county judge before the turn of the century, and was the first school teacher in the historic community of Champeo, in the Willamette valley.

Mr. Baldwin was married on March 12, 1903 at Jacksonville to Rose O'Brien. He spent the greater part of his life in Jackson and Josephine counties, moving to Ashland in 1926.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Kenneth H. Baldwin, Redding, Calif., and John R. Baldwin, Talent, and a daughter, Mrs. P. R. Berke, Portland.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 p.m. at Litwiller's Mountain View Chapel, Ashland, with the Rev. L. L. Neifert, Talent, officiating. Interment will be in Mountain View cemetery.
