THE RETARDED CHILD

Mrs. Pearl S. Buck has just written me about the National Association for Retarded Children. They have booklets which could be very helpful to parents who feel lost and puzzled when one of their children fails to develop properly. Many have trouble finding what the cause of the trouble is; few can learn what can be done for the child; few know where there are schools or agencies that can help; few know how much the child can be trained to do; many cannot make up their mind whether to keep the child at home or put him in an institution, or school; many are worried as to whether they should dare have another child.

Unfortunately, most of us doctors know very little about the subject because, in college, we heard only a few words about it, if we heard any at all. By writing to the Association, puzzled parents can get answers to their questions. The booklets will refer them to larger books, and will give them the names and addresses of the several associations that can help.

Many persons who have wealth and influence in the community could do so much to help the cause of the forgotten child. As I pointed out recently in this column, in the one state of Missouri there are probably some 12,000 retarded children who need special education and who, with it, might be made self-supporting. But the available schools can take only some 2,000. Obviously, many more such schools should be built throughout this country. They would pay large dividends of several types.

Wiser To Train Child

A city or state that allows its mentally retarded children to sit at home and vegetate without proper education is so foolish because, for the rest of his days, that child, and later man, will have to be taken care of at great cost. How much wiser to train the child (when possible) to support himself. There are many things in this world that a mentally subnormal person can do well. He does not have to learn algebra! I have known excellent servants who could barely read and write.

As Mrs. Buck points out so well, we in America are inclined to reach down into our pockets generously in order to provide help for unfortunate people with a disease so rare that the average doctor never sees a case in all his years of practice! This, of course, is all right, and I am sure Mrs. Buck has not the least desire to stop such persons from getting help.

But there are other diseases that are immensely more common, and in some of these we Americans take almost no interest. For their study we spend almost no money. Sometimes we seem to feel that the less said about an unpleasant subject the better. When I barely mention it in this column, I receive a pile of bitter letters. Mrs. Buck tells me that in Connecticut, in every 100,000 children 35 are blind; 120 have had polio; 1,750 have had heart disease, and 250 are handicapped by cerebral palsy; but 2,500 are mentally retarded. We raise huge sums for the 120 with polio but we do little more than hide away the 2,500 who are mentally retarded.

Defect Often Hereditary

Today, we know that in many cases the defect is a hereditary one. If one searches through the family one may not find other cases of mental retardation, but

mothers of handicapped children because she has a little girl who never quite grew up.
On Growing Old Gracefully
An interesting woman of 74 writes from an old people's home to tell me how much she was helped by the idea that old people must keep busy. Also, that they must keep up contacts with others and especially young persons. They must not spend much time telling about their troubles to anyone who will listen or who cannot get away.

As my correspondent says, she has been on crutches for seven years. She has a smashed hip, a bad heart, and a few other troubles, but she refuses to do as

some of the old ladies do, and fold hands in resignation. With the help of newspapers and the radio she keeps up with what is going on in the world; she plays

cards when she can, and the thing that boosts her morale most is the fact that she is still doing clerical work that helps the Mother Superior.
