Pappy Waldorf
Will Pilot Cal
Bears Next Year

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf closed out his worst season in his eight years as University of California football coach Saturday and insisted that he would be back to pilot the Bears again next year.

Waldorf said he had no intention of resigning after his team absorbed a 19-0 licking at the hands of arch-rival Stanford to give the Bears a season mark of two wins, seven losses and one tie.

"It is my intention to complete my contract as head coach at California," the portly mentor said. "It was just a down year for the Bears."

Waldorf has one year to go on his present contract. Although he has taken Cal to the Rose Bowl three times during his eight-year reign, there have been recent rumblings of discontent from the UC campus and alumni. He was hanged in effigy a few weeks ago.

Waldorf placed much of the blame for today's defeat on Stanford's ability to shoot its linebackers through the gaps. "This caused a lot of trouble in our offense," he said.

Happy Stanford
Over in the quietly happy Stanford dressing room Indian Coach Chuck Taylor termed this year's team better than the one that went to the Rose Bowl five years ago.

It was Stanford's first victory over the Bears in nine years of "Big Game" rivalry.

19-0 in 58th 'Big Game'

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — The Stanford Indians, unleashing all the fury built up after eight years of frustration, walloped the California Bears, 19-0 Saturday before 91,500 sun-bathed fans at Stanford stadium in the 58th renewal of the "Big Game."

Winning their first game with their traditional rival in nine years, the Indians pushed Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf's team around the field all afternoon as they scored one touchdown in the first quarter, another in the second and the third in the

Ohio Ruins
Michigan's
Bowl Hopes

Ann Arbor, Mich. — (U.P.) — Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy ran roughshod over Michigan in his final college game Saturday to lift Ohio State to its second straight Big Ten title with a 17-0 victory which knocked the Wolverines out of a Rose Bowl bid.

Cassidy, the 21-year-old senior from Columbus, O., raced 146 yards in 28 carries in the finest running display at Michigan Stadium since the days of Tom Harmon as a record crowd of 97,369 watched.

The fleet-footed Cassidy scored Ohio State's first touchdown on a two-yard smash in the fourth period and set up a 17-yard field goal by end Fred Kriss in the second period with his shifty running.

Safety Added
The Buckeyes added a safety when fullback Don Vico tackled Terry Barr in the end zone and a second touchdown on Vico's one-yard smash in the closing minutes.

Ohio State can't make the Rose Bowl trip since the Buckeyes played at Pasadena last New Year's Day. Michigan State, which claimed second place in the Big Ten as a result of Ohio State's victory, is certain to get the bid.

It was Ohio State's first victory here since 1937 and stretched to 13 straight games the Buckeye conference winning streak. They won seven in a row last year and six straight this season.

Incredible Credell Leads
Huskies to 27-7 Victory

Seattle — (U.P.) — Fullback Credell (Incredible) Green lived up to his nickname Saturday as he led Washington to a 27-7 Pacific Coast conference football victory over Washington State in a season's end game on a quagmire field before 30,000 homecoming fans.

Incredible as it may seem, here's what the 20-year-old Richmond, Calif., Negro did: Carried the ball 258 yards, a new national record for an individual player in a single game this season (Jim Swink's 225 yards for Texas Christian last week was the previous record.)

Ran for two touchdowns, one a 50 yard gallop. Intercepted a pass which set up his 50-yard touchdown run. Scored the first Washington touchdown from more than 17 yards out in 41 consecutive games.

Turned in the third best rushing performance for one season in modern Washington football history (only Hugh McElhenny's two top years are better.) Green's total for the year is 652 yards.

Washington scored first in the second period when quarterback Steve Roake sneaked over from the one-yard line to clip max an 80-yard march, which included a 39-yard sprint by Green. With a minute and five seconds left in the first half, quarterback Sandy Lederman passed 24 yards to halfback Bob Herring in the end zone for the second Husky score.

Green, a junior, added another touchdown early in the third period when he skirted left end from 18 yards out to put the topper on a drive that started when he intercepted quarterback Bob Iverson's pass on the Washington State 43. Then came his spectacular 50-yard dash. He broke through right tackle and couldn't be touched.

Fresno, Calif. (U.P.) — The strong throwing arm of quarterback-halfback John Steinborn led the fired-up Fresno State Bulldogs to a 19-13 victory Friday over their arch-rival San Jose State Spartans.

It was the Bulldogs' first win over the Spartans since 1947—and there was no doubt that they earned it. Fresno made 21 first downs to San Jose's 9, rolled up 282 yards rushing to San Jose's 121.
