

Ducks Blast OSC Bowl Hopes With 28-0 Win; Morris Sets UO Record

Eugene—(U.P.)—Oregon, which was supposed to be all speed and no power, turned on a steam-roller attack here Saturday on sloppy Hayward field and in four powerful marches drove to a 28-0 Pacific Coast conference victory over Oregon State.

The Oregon State team, surprise of the conference, went into the game with a chance of winning the PCC title. But the Bruins, who now finish in second place with a 5-2 record, couldn't put together a scoring combination, nor could they do anything to stop the rampaging Webfoots.

Only Four Officials

The game was played with only four officials on the field, instead of the usual five. Two of the scheduled officials, Mel Nickerson and Tom Fitzpatrick, didn't arrive in time when their train was delayed. An alternate, Gerald Laurens, filled in one spot and the other was left vacant.

The absence of one arbiter failed to slow the fired-up Oregon eleven, however, as they slammed through the Oregon State defense to score in drives of 71, 65, 51 and 60 yards.

Halfback Jim Shanley, a 168-pound sophomore speedster, ended the first two drives with plunges of seven and two yards into the end zone.

Quarterback Tom Crabtree, playing one of his finest games of his career, plunged over from the one-yard-line for the third score and capped an all-Oregon

afternoon by bootlegging around left end for two yards and Oregon's fourth touchdown.

Bruins Cinch Bid To Rose Bowl; Top Trojan Team 17-7

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—UCLA's "bread and butter" players, Sam Brown and Bob Davenport, led the Bruins to a Rose Bowl bid and their third straight Pacific Coast Conference championship Saturday by slaying out a 17-7 victory over University of Southern California before 95,878 fans in Memorial Coliseum.

Aside from a couple of key passes, UCLA stuck to the ground where halfback Brown and fullback Davenport slashed and plunged for long yardage to touchdown drives in the first and fourth periods and a field goal in the second.

No Question

The West's Rose Bowl representative won't officially be named until Monday but with the defeat of Oregon State there was no question that UCLA would return to Pasadena January 1.

Southern California marched deep into UCLA territory three times but only one of the marches— in the final period—resulted in a score as the charging, thudding UCLA line bottled up vaunted Trojan halfback Jon Arnett. The runs of fullbacks Gordon Duvall and C. R. Roberts kept the Trojan drives moving.

Arnett electrified the huge crowd and the national TV audience when he raced the opening kickoff 7 yards to the UCLA goal only to be called back because Southern Cal was offside. There was no "goat" on this one. The entire USC line was charged with the offside.

Brown Cuts Loose

UCLA put together its first scoring drive after Brown and Arnett had exchanged quick kicks of better than 60 yards

each. Then Brown cut loose with the first of two UCLA passes during the entire game, this one for 21 yards to end Ronnie Loudd on the Southern Cal 17, from where Brown and Davenport punched to the four and Brown scored.

UCLA started another drive late in the first period and drove to the Trojan 19 where Jim Decker, whose field goal last week defeated Washington with seconds to go, booted another from the 19 in the opening seconds of the second period to put UCLA into a 10-0 halftime lead.

66 points, held jointly by Dick James (1954) and Johnny Kitzmiller (1928).

The inspired Webfoots, playing before 22,000 homecoming fans, completely throttled Oregon State's attack, holding the Beavers to 77 yards total offense.

Shanley and James were the big factors in Oregon's scoring drives. Shanley carried 27 times for 160 yards and James, the all-purpose back who has been mentioned for All-Star honors, smashed for 114 yards in 22 tries.

Broke Up Attack

The Oregon line, led by End Phil McHugh and Tackles Lon Stiner and Harry Johnson, broke through Oregon State's screen of blockers repeatedly to stop the Beaver attack before it could get rolling.

Tackle John Witte played an outstanding game for Oregon State and Little Sam Wesley showed a few brilliant flashes in the Beaver backfield.

It was the most lopsided victory for Oregon in the 59 years of rivalry between the two schools since the Webfoots walloped Oregon State 38-0 in 1899.

Michigan State Bowl-Bound; TCU To Play in Cotton Bowl

Michigan State sneaked into the Rose Bowl through the back door and Texas Christian was named as the host team for the Cotton Bowl following Saturday's climactic games of the 1955 college football campaign.

The Spartans wound up as the logical Big Ten representatives for the Rose Bowl when Ohio State turned back Michigan, 17-0, in the game of the day. It was the Buckeyes' first triumph over Michigan at Ann Arbor since 1937 and enabled them to walk off with their second straight conference crown.

Ohio State Barred

However, Ohio State is barred from a return trip to the Rose Bowl, thus leaving the door open to Michigan State, which completed its conference schedule last week with a 5-1 record compared to Michigan's closing mark of 5-2.

The Spartans were busy rolling up a 33-0 victory over Marquette in their regular-season finale when news of Michigan's defeat was received, and ecstatic State fans celebrated immediately by tearing down the goal posts.

TCU earned its berth in the Cotton Bowl with a runaway 35-0 victory over Rice in their Southwest Conference tilt.

The running of Howard (Hop-along) Cassidy, who was playing his final college game, and smashing line play carried Ohio State to its stunning victory over Michigan before a record crowd of 97,369 at Ann Arbor. Cassidy scored one touchdown on a two-yard plunge, set up a 17-yard field goal by end Fred Kriss with his shifty running and wound up with 146 yards gained in 28 carries.

Swink Scores Once

Flashy Jimmy Swink, the nation's leading scorer, tallied one touchdown in TCU's rout over Rice at Fort Worth, Tex., but his mates took up the slack by producing long scoring marches in every period. Quarterback Charley Curtis pitched

one touchdown pass and directed a diversified attack for the Horned Frogs.

Top-ranked Oklahoma, meanwhile, clinched its eighth straight Big Seven Conference title by downing Nebraska, 41-0. It was the Sooners' 28th straight victory and extended their unbeaten streak in the Big Seven to 54 games.

Maryland, already named as Oklahoma's opponent in the Orange Bowl, completed an unbeaten season with a 19-0 victory over George Washington. The Terrapins were outplayed in the second half, but Ed Vereb provided them with a safe cushion when he scored twice in the opening half.

Pittsburgh boosted its chances for a bowl offer by overpowering Penn State, 20-0, while Auburn, another bowl hopeful, rolled to a 21-0 victory over Clemson behind the passing and running of quarterback Howell Tubbs.

Notre Dame stormed from behind with 10 points in the final eight minutes to beat Iowa, 17-14; Yale ignored a driving snowstorm to smash Harvard, 21-7; Princeton won the Ivy League title by edging Dartmouth, 6-3, and Detroit clinched at least a tie for the Missouri Valley Conference crown by beating Tulsa, 19-13, in a wild-punch-filled game.

Texas Tech Tips COP Eleven 13-7 In Final Period

Lubbock, Tex.—(U.P.)—Jack Kirkpatrick, a third string quarterback, came off the bench Saturday to steer Texas Tech 58 yards in the fourth quarter to the touchdown that gave Tech a 13-7 victory over College of the Pacific.

A sun-baked crowd of 16,300 fans watched Tech score in the first quarter on a 52-yard drive and College of the Pacific take the lead in the second quarter.

Texas Tech came from behind on halfback Hugh Fewin's one foot plunge into the end zone at 8:41 of the final quarter.

Kirkpatrick coolly directed the raiders in a 58-yard drive after Halfback Don Cornell's punt had gone only 18 yards to the Tech 42. With Halfback M. C. Northam, Fullback Lonnie Graham and Kirkpatrick carrying, interspersed with passes from Kirkpatrick to Fewin and End Ken Vakey, the Raiders moved to the Tiger 4. Northam went to the goal and Fewin carried over.

Key play in the march was a 13-yard pass on third down from Kirkpatrick to Vakey, who was stopped at the Tiger four.

Sugar Ray Trains For Title Fight

Greenwood Lake, N.Y.—Sugar Ray Robinson sparred four rounds Saturday, two each against Joe Williams and Lee Williams, in preparation for his Dec. 9 middleweight title fight with champion Bobo Olson at Chicago.

Robinson began today's workout by running five miles during a snow storm. He plans to box again tomorrow.

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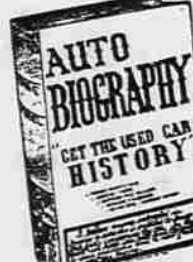
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
