

W. Pastrano Beats Rowan In 10-Rounds

New York—(U.P.)—Young Willie Pastrano of New Orleans promised today, "I'll show more speed in future bouts" than he did in his first fight as a heavy-weight Friday night while winning a unanimous 10-round decision over tough Joey Rowan at Madison Square Garden.

The victory in his New York debut earned 19-year-old Willie another TV-radio fight at the garden on Jan. 6, probably against Chuck Spieser of Lansing, Mich. Spieser lost to Pastrano in a good fight at Chicago on July 27 but knocked out Paddy Young in the second round last Wednesday.

"I felt a little sloppy Friday night because I weighed the heaviest ever," said Willie, who is ranked second among light heavy weight contenders although he has outgrown the division. "But I was fast enough to beat Rowan and probably for most heavyweights. Just the same, I'll show a lot more speed in the future."

Hard Fight
Friday night he weighed 181 3/4 pounds—exactly the same as heavyweight Rowan of Phoenixville, Pa., who gave Willie a hard fight and buckled his knees with a left to the head and right to the body in the fourth round.

Rowan, 21, had his unbeaten string snapped at nine by Pastrano, whose left jabs and sneaker rights found the target more often and extended Willie's unbeaten string to 14. Each fighter had a draw in his unbeaten cluster.

Irish Joey was warned seven times by Referee Ruby Goldstein for low punches, heeling and butting as he forced the fighting in every round with a combination hooking attack to body and head.

Medford's Entry In Class B League Hinges on Meet

The possibility of Medford entering the Class B Northwest baseball league hinges on the outcome of a meeting to be held at the Holland hotel tomorrow night at 8 o'clock. Persons interested in Medford being in the league have been invited to the meeting, where financing will be the main topic of discussion. A valley business firm has agreed to underwrite about half of the cost of the entry and financing for the remainder will have to be found. Problems concerning use of the Fairgrounds park also will come up for discussion. **Eight Teams in League** Teams now in the league are Spokane, Wenatchee, Yakima and Tri-City in Washington, Lewiston, Ida., and Salem and Eugene in Oregon. A possible working agreement with the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League also is pending tomorrow night's meeting. James M. (Jim) Fleishman, Portland lumber broker who last week was named league president to succeed Orin C. (Babe) Hollingberry, said he will concentrate his efforts to get Medford into the league. The circuit, third highest in professional baseball, is made up mostly of young players who have had two or three years' experience in pro ball. Each team is allowed a quota of veteran players for a team nucleus. Local baseball enthusiasts believe that the valley has grown in population sufficiently since Medford was in the Class D Far West league that return of professional ball here, in a higher classification will be supported.

Pros Could Move Into 5-Way Tie

If five National Football League teams — the Detroit Lions, Baltimore Colts, Green Bay Packers, Pittsburgh Steelers and Washington Redskins—win today, the division races will be locked tighter than a miser's fist.

In that event there would be a four-way tie for first place in the Western Division and a two-way tie for the Eastern lead. The Los Angeles Rams, Chicago Bears, Colts and Packers would be tied for the Western lead with 5-4 records, while the Cleveland Browns and Redskins would be tied for the Eastern lead with 6-3 marks.

To produce such sardine packing in the Western scramble, the Lions (2-6) must whip the Bears (5-3), the Colts (4-4) must defeat the Rams (5-3), and the Packers (4-4) must down the San Francisco Forty-Niners (3-5).

The Bears are favored by 13 points to boost the league's longest current winning streak to six at Detroit. The Rams, tied with the Bears for the lead, are six-point choices at Baltimore. The Packers, tied with the Colts for second, are slim, one-point favorites against the Forty-Niners at Milwaukee. **Steelers Must Win**

To deadlock the Eastern race, the Steelers (4-4) must defeat the champion Browns (6-2) at Cleveland and the Redskins (5-3) must defeat the Cardinals (3-4-1) at Chicago. The Browns, who lead the second-place Redskins by a game, are 11-point favorites. The Cardinals are one-point favorites. The Philadelphia Eagles (3-4-1) visit the New York Giants (3-5) in the other game. The Eagles are favored by 1 1/2 points.

The last-place Lions, who won the Western title for the past three years, can help decide their successor because two of their remaining games are with the rampaging Bears. But the Bears, currently the league's hottest team, are in good shape for Sunday's Briggs Stadium tussle while halfback Bob Hornschemeyer and end Dorne Dibble of the Lions are out with injuries.

Vandals Trounce Montana 31-0 in Traditional Test

Moscow, Idaho — (U.P.)—The University of Idaho Vandals rolled to an easy 31 to 0 Dad's Day football victory Saturday over out classed Montana State University in their traditional battle for the Little Brown Stein.

An unexpected crowd of 1500 witnessed the contest—beset with numerous fumbles—that was played on a slush covered field in a heavy rain. Buses were used along the sidelines instead of benches for protection of the players.

The game was sparked by Fullback Wilbur Gary—holder of a new Pacific Coast conference record of 28.6 yards per carry—who crossed the goal line for three of Idaho's five scores. Quarterback Gary Johnson made the first score of the game on a quarterback sneak and right half Ron Braden romped 55 yards around left end to give Idaho a 13 to 0 half-time lead.

Gary, playing his last game for Idaho, made all three of his tallies in the third quarter, one on an off tackle play and two on runs around right end. Jerry Kramer Vandal guard, made the only point after touchdown of the game.

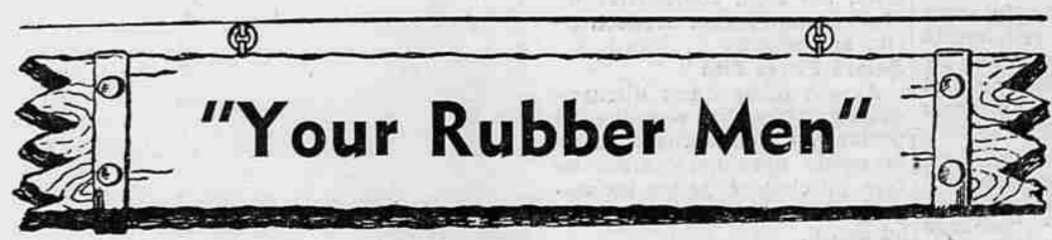
