Marie Dionne Leaves Convent Second Time

Montreal — (U.P.)—Marie Dionne, frailest and shyest of the surviving quintuplets, has left her cloistered convent life of silence and prayer for the second time and taken refuge in a hospital where two of her sisters are studying nursing, it was reported Saturday.

Aviation Safety Meeting Scheduled

A meeting on aviation safety for operators, examiners and chief mechanics in southern Oregon and northern California will be held here Tuesday, it was reported Saturday.

Sponsored by the Medford office of aviation safety of the Civil Aeronautics administration, the meeting will be held in the Jackson county courthouse from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Invitations have been sent to airport operators and others in an area between Eugene on the north and Eureka and Weed on the south.

Discussions of changes in CAA air regulations, methods of increasing safety in aviation operations, and changes in approved flight schools will be conducted.

Ask Price Increase For Cremation Cases

Portland — (U.P.)—Representatives of the Oregon Interment Association have asked the State Public Welfare commission to hike the funeral allowance for cremation cases.

The request asked that the cremation allowance be increased from \$25 to \$110, the present allowance for earth burial. The commission took the request under advisement.

Oliva Dionne, father of the 21-year-old quint, said he was told by telephone that Marie quietly left the convent of the order of the Servants of the Most Holy Sacrament in Quebec City last Wednesday.

Confirmed by Convent
A source at the convent, one of the strictest in the Roman Catholic church, confirmed Marie had left but would not comment further. An informant close to the Dionne family said Marie had gone to L'hôpital Notre Dame de L'esperance in Ville St. Laurent, near Montreal.

There was no official confirmation from the hospital, but Marie was known to have been seen there Friday.

Marie was the most deeply affected member of the Dionne family when Emilie died Aug. 6, 1954, during an epileptic seizure. It was only after a year at school and in seclusion with her family that Marie felt able to take up again the rigid life of a novice in a nunnery.

When Marie first entered the convent on Nov. 3, 1953, she said that "since my childhood I have nourished the desire of entering a religious order."

Her father said that "spiritual values have always been her main preoccupation."

Frailest of Quints
Marie was the frailest of the quint, at birth and for many days her life hung in the balance. As a child she wore a black eye patch to correct an eye ailment and she is the only one of the quint to wear glasses.

Neither Cecile nor Yvonne could be reached at the hospital. They have avoided interviews since they began their training two years ago, and the hospital's policy is to protect their privacy.

Papa Dionne said he did not know what Marie's plans were. He indicated he had not heard from her directly about her departure from the convent.

Graham Used Simple Timing Device Says Denver Newspaper

Denver — (U.P.)—John Gilbert Graham allegedly used a common kitchen timing device purchased in Denver to set off the bomb that sent 44 persons, including his own mother, to death in the flaming crash of a United Air Lines DC6B near Longmont, Colo.

The Rocky Mountain News, a Scripps-Howard newspaper, said Saturday it had learned Graham purchased the timing device from the Ryall Electric Supply company here two weeks before the airliner crashed Nov. 1.

Morris Bergerhouse, manager of the supply company, would neither confirm nor deny the story. But he said he had identified a photograph of Graham for the FBI.

Poses as Employee
In an exclusive interview with Joseph T. Grande, the salesman who sold Graham the 60-minute timer, Denver radio station KIMN disclosed that Graham had posed as an employee of the "Colorado Texas Pump Co."

Grande said Graham told him he wanted the timer for use on a six-volt pumping circuit. Graham specified an on-timer rather than a clock that turned appliances off, Grande said.

Still a mystery was where Graham purchased the 25 sticks of dynamite, a battery, eight feet of wire and two dynamite caps he allegedly used to fashion the time bomb.

The 23-year-old suspect meanwhile steadfastly denied the murder-for-insurance of his 54-year-old mother and said the FBI forced him to admit the charge by prolonged questioning and threats against his wife.

Dozen Witnesses Testify in Murder Trial of Sherry

Portland — (U.P.)—A dozen witnesses testified Friday in the first degree murder trial of Sherry Fong, as the defense made four new motions for a mistrial.

Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson deferred ruling on the new motions, and Defense Attorney Irvin Goodman's running objections, which were based on "prejudicial" testimony.

All of Friday's witnesses were connected with law enforcement, leading to speculation that the state intended to link the slaying of 16-year-old Diane Hank to a narcotics ring.

Howard Loneragan, chief prosecutor in the trial, told the jury of six men and six women in his opening statement that "the motive for this killing lies in the narcotics trade."

Rebuted from Bench
However, Judge Dobson, who declared a mistrial earlier this month in the state's second attempt to convict Sherry, rebuked Loneragan from the bench and the prosecutor did not elaborate.

Loneragan said that while Diane apparently died from barbiturates and alcohol in a poisonous combination, she could possibly have been smothered.

Robert Wayne Richards, one-time sheriff's deputy and bartender, said Sherry told him a narcotics syndicate wanted "to get rid of" Diane because the girl was talking too much. He said Sherry told him she wanted to save the high school student, and offered \$125,000 "to get the syndicate off Diane's neck."

Richards said Sherry claimed to be the head of a narcotics trade that covered the Northwest as far south as Eureka, Calif., with 24 outlets.

Sherry and her husband, Wey Him Fong, were convicted of the 1954 slaying several months ago, but Judge Dobson overruled the conviction on technical grounds.

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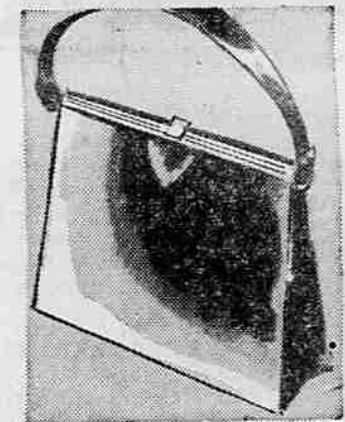
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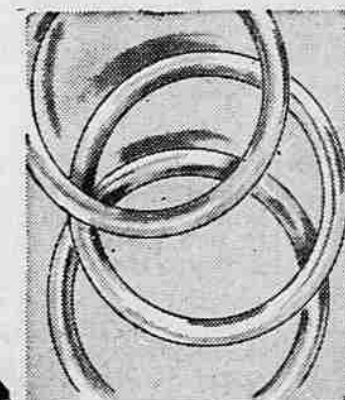
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
