Mrs. A. H. Gregory is general chairman of the event.

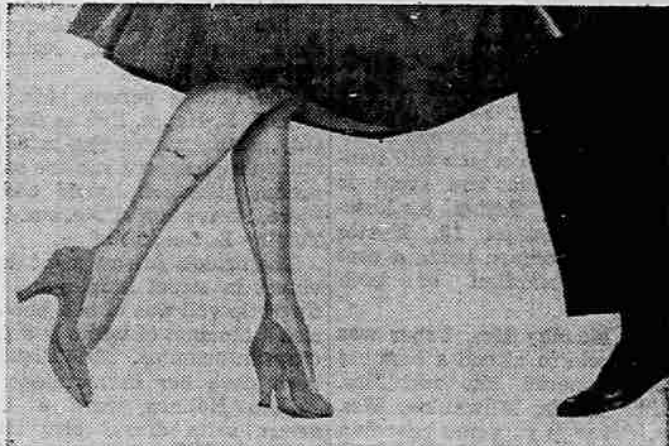
DOCTOR TO LEAVE
