

Geneva Meeting Highlights

Washington—(U.P.)—Highlights of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' report on the Geneva foreign ministers meeting:

Verbatim statement from President Eisenhower read by Dulles: "I know that no setback, no obstacle to progress will ever deter this government and our people from the great effort to establish a just and durable peace. Success may be long in coming, but there is no temporal force so capable of helping achieve it as the strength, the might, the spirit of 163 million free Americans. In striving toward this shining goal, this country will never admit defeat."

Dulles' explanation of why "no specific agreements" were reached: "The Soviet Union ap-

pears to want certain results in terms of European security, disarmament and contacts of a sort. But it is not yet willing to pay the price. . . in terms of doing what is inherently necessary to reach the results which we all say we want."

"On this occasion (the Geneva conference) no positive results were achieved."

The Western powers "showed their confidence in their own strength and in the steadfastness of their own people. Thereby, this conference may have improved the prospects for real agreements in the future."

The conference demonstrated that the Russians "are not yet willing to create the indispensable conditions for a secure peace." But "they seem not to want to revert to the earlier reliance on threats and invective. In that respect the spirit of Geneva still survives."

"President Eisenhower said that he believed that the summit conference made it less likely that there would be open war between our countries. Nothing that happened at the foreign ministers conference requires a change in that estimate. . ."

"The cold war in the sense of peaceful competition will inevitably go on. . . We must assume that the Soviet Union will continue its efforts by means short of war to make its system prevail as it has done in the past. We can, however, hope that this competition will not entail all the same hostility and animosity which so defiled the relations between us in the past."

"Will the United States now have radically to revise its program for defense and mutual security? The answer to this is no. We have not lowered our guard."

"Neither the President nor I believe that it the Geneva conference will be an end" to future negotiation with the Soviet Union. "It would of course be foolish to attempt new negotiations

Southern Pacific Orders 10,000 Cars

Chicago—(U.P.)—The nation's railroads, placing their biggest freight car order since the 1920s, are contracting for 145,000 new freight cars.

William T. Farley, president of the Association of American Railroads, told a news conference Friday that the new order will cost a total of about \$1,250,000,000.

The new order includes 57,500 freight cars on order as Nov. 1, and another 87,500 cars the railroad said they would buy before

Dec. 31. Farley admitted that a major factor in the purchase is that government provisions for rapid tax amortization on freight cars expire Dec. 31.

There was no breakdown of individual railroad orders, but President D. J. Russell of the Southern Pacific, announced that his road ordered 10,700 cars, and delivery was expected to begin next year.

Power Interrupted In Medford; Wind Causes Fire Calls

Electrical service to a portion of Northeast Medford was interrupted for about an hour when a 12,000 volt primer line burned in two and fell to the ground about 10:30 a.m. Saturday.

Two pumps were dispatched by Medford fire department to the 600 block on Valley View dr. in answer to a call from a woman who reported she had seen the house across the street explode and break into flames.

Repairs Working

Electrical repairs were already working on the 12,000 volt line when the firemen arrived.

An automatic switch cut the power out of the line as soon as it shorted out on the ground. Current was re-routed until the line was repaired.

Several alarms were received by the fire department Friday during a period of high wind.

At 7:34 p.m., Friday, one pumper was dispatched to the residence of Thomas C. Bolton, 217 Windsor ave. Lights in the house had become over-bright and some light bulbs were burned out. Firemen stood by until electricians could check the cause of the trouble.

Firemen Stand By

At 7:35 p.m., one fire engine was dispatched to the 1000 block of West Main st. where electric lead-in wires were being blown together. Firemen stood by until a California Oregon Power company repair crew arrived.

Pumpers were dispatched to flue fires at the Max Barraclough residence, 1031 Cherry st., at 8 p.m., Friday, and to the residence of James Hackett, 1020 East Eleventh st., at 8:10 p.m. No damage was reported from either fire.

Hatfield to Resign Willamette U Post

Salem—(U.P.)—Mark Hatfield, who this week announced his candidacy for Republican nomination for secretary of state, will resign as dean of students and assistant professor of political science at Willamette University here next July 1.

Hatfield said he would not ask for renewal of his contract, which expires next summer.

Observers said the decision would leave Hatfield free to wage an all-out campaign for the office of secretary of state.
