Rosana has been a top thespian in Italy for five years, appearing in several films with her handsome husband, actor Marco Vicaro. Last year Warners combed the world for a beauty to portray Helen of Troy. Rosana won the coveted role of the face that launched a thousand ships and the soon-to-be released "Helen of Troy" was filmed in Italy.

In the picture you'll see Rosana as a siren with long blonde hair who whispers sweet nothings to Paris Jacques Sernas in perfect English. But in real life she is a surprisingly sweet-faced girl who wears no make-up and has short, brown hair. The movie voice, she explained, was dubbed.

City Dwellers Find Things More Crowded

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — If you are a city dweller and have the feeling that things are getting more crowded all the time, you're absolutely right, according to a statistical-minded geographer at the University of California here.

Dr. Howard J. Nelson has reported that 99,000,000 persons out of the estimated 165,000,000 persons in the U. S. now live on only one per cent of the nation's land.

While the living conditions he outlined look uncomfortable, Nelson brought out that property owners should be happy with the crowded state of affairs since that one per cent of land is worth more than all the 99 per cent non-urban land left over.

Other points about American cities, Nelson reported, included the facts that about one-third of the 107 cities having a population of more than 100,000 were founded in pre-Revolutionary days, and that only two such cities—Tulsa, Okla., and Gary, Ind., were founded in the 20th century.
