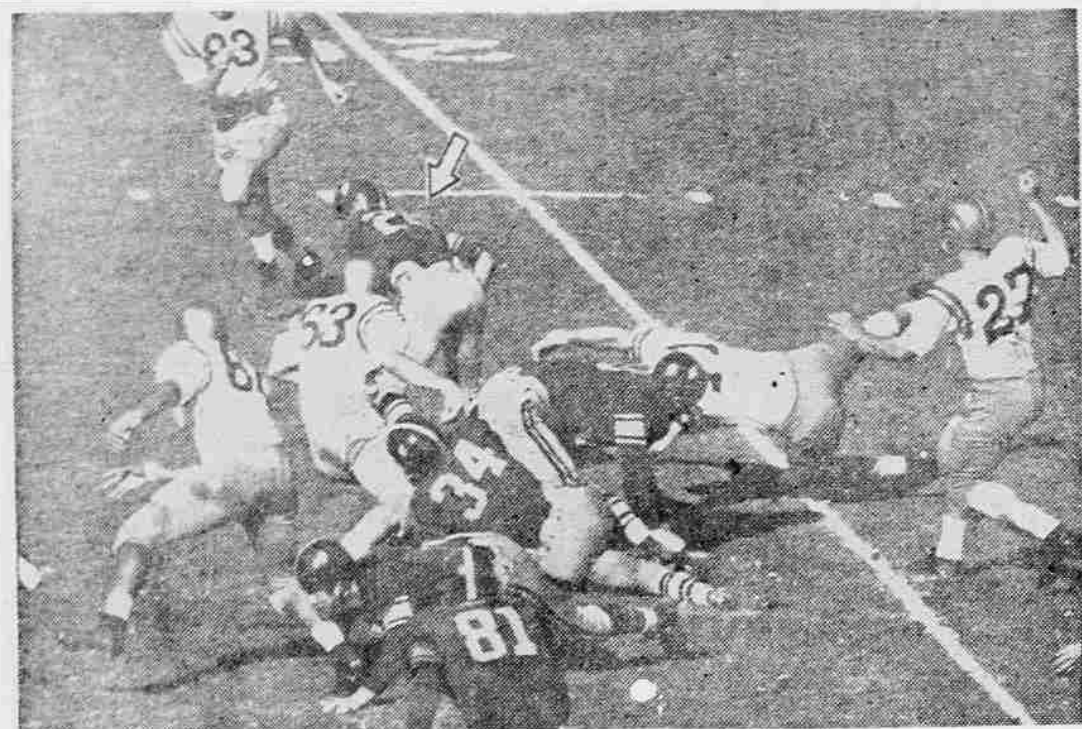

H. Elledge Takes First In Cycle Run

Harry Elledge, Rogue River, won the first place trophy but Bob Killian, Grants Pass, got the turkey Sunday in the motorcycle turkey run competition sponsored by White's Cycle shop of Medford.

Elledge picked up an amazing 245 points out of a possible 250 in the 60-mile semi-endurance run over outlying country of the county. Bob Killian found the turkey in an uphill dash and hunt from clubgrounds in the Sams valley district which followed the 60-mile race.

Don Randles, Medford, took second place trophy with 231 points. Thirteen riders, out of 32 who signed up, started the race. Nine finished.

Dick Killian was third in the run, followed by twin brother Bob. Other finishers were Don Sample, Medford, fifth; Kenneth Tucker, Medford, sixth; Charles Beak, Rogue River, seventh; Bill Goin, Phoenix, eighth; and Bill Kidson, Medford, ninth.

Elledge was close to the time schedule set up for the race. Riders were penalized for arriving at check points too early or too late. Route of the race stayed clear of main highways. Riders went through Sams Valley and Gold Hill. They went to Rogue River by the back road, went up west Evans creek to Wimer and went back to Sams Valley by way of Ramsey canyon. Start of the race was the Richfield service station on Highway 99 north of Medford.

Fiore Beats Nocero; Gets 2nd TV Bout

New York—(U.P.)—Welterweight Carmine Fiore of Brooklyn, back in action with a "new face" and an improved right hand, will get another TV fight at St. Nicholas Arena on Dec. 19 because of Monday night's victory over Middleweight Rinzino Nocero.

"Thirteen months rest gave me a new face," said left-hooker Fiore today. "It never cut once. Not even a scratch around my eyes."

Swarthy, broad-shouldered Carmine, who won a unanimous 10-round decision over fellow Brooklynite Nocero at St. Nick's, will be back in the same ring four weeks hence with Danny Giovanelli, also of Brooklyn.

Fiore was happy about his face because face-cuts in the past had caused him to suffer eight technical knockouts. After his last kayo by Vine Martinez on Oct. 29, 1954, he took a long rest to let time and the sun heal his wounds properly.

Twenty-six-year-old Carmine, favored at 9-5, weighed 149½ pounds to Nocero's 155½. His left hooks beat bigger Rinzino, but the hardest punch of the fight was Carmine's right to the chin that buckled Rinzino's knees in the sixth round. Nocero is 24.

The official rounds vote favored Fiore 54-1, 64, 64. The United Press had it 6-4.

It was Carmine's 48th victory in 71 fights and Nocero's fourth defeat in 30.

The Dec. 19th fight with Giovanelli will be a return bout. Carmine outpointed him on Sept. 11, 1953.

Rose Bowl Elects UCLA

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—UCLA, Pacific Coast Conference champion, was selected yesterday to represent the conference in the 1956 Rose Bowl Game against the Big Ten representative Michigan State.

The selection, a formality since Red Sanders, powerful Bruins copped the conference crown without a loss, was announced by PCC Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt after tabulation of conference member votes. The vote was unanimous.

Interest In AAU Grows As Olympic Tryouts Approach

New York—(U.P.)—The excitement of an Olympic year is AAU championship competitions at next month's convention, the AAU announced today.

"Since it is expected that some championships will serve as final Olympic tryouts and others will be eliminations for the final selection of the team, more than usual interest in the awards has been aroused," the AAU reported.

Bakersfield, Calif., probably will be "a strong contender" for the coveted outdoor track championships, the AAU said. The 1956 tournament will serve as a semi-final in the Olympic tryouts, sending top men on to Los Angeles.

Decision on this bid and others will be made at the AAU's convention in Louisville, Ky., Dec. 1-4.

Third Straight Week
The Sooners, who retained the top spot for the third week in a row, widened their lead over Michigan State from 13 to 34 points. Oklahoma's first-place vote total was four more than last week. Wilkinson's Maunders extended their winning streak to 28 and clinched their 10th consecutive BIG Seven championship with a 41-0 triumph over Nebraska.

With points distributed on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis for votes from first to 10th places, here is how the top 10 lined up: Oklahoma 317; Michigan State 283; Maryland 268; UCLA 245; Notre Dame 210; Ohio State 171; Texas Christian 152; Texas A&M 85; Georgia Tech 79; Navy 31. UCLA and Notre Dame exchanged the rankings they held last week.

Auburn advanced one notch to head the "second 10" teams, followed in order by Michigan, Pittsburgh and Stanford. West Virginia and Mississippi were tied for 15th place; Washington and Duke shared the No. 17 ranking; and Southern California and Iowa tied for 19th place.
