Unemployment Pay Meets Open To Public

Salem — (U.P.) — State Unemployment Compensation Commission hearings are generally open to the public, Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today.

But in rare cases, his opinion said, the commission has discretion to hold a closed session. The opinion followed a recent hearing by a representative of the commission in Roseburg to which a reporter on a Roseburg newspaper was denied admittance.

The commission asked Thornton in effect if a member of the public could be excluded from a hearing upon a claim or contribution matter. He replied that such hearings are quasi-judicial functions of the commission and statutes governing them provide for a fair hearing.

Rescue of Stranded Tower Visitors Due

Boston — (U.P.) — The sea-going tug El Sol was en route today to pick up 37 visitors stranded five days on the nation's first Texas Tower, some 100 miles off the tip of Cape Cod.

A spokesman for the Raymond-Delong Corp., which set the radar and weather observing station in the sands of Georges Bank, said the visitors, Air Force technicians and observers, to Quincy, Mass., by tomorrow morning.

Winds of hurricane force have battered the triangular-shaped steel tower since the visitors reached it last Thursday morning. Waves 30 to 35 feet high have been pounding into it. The platform of the station rests 70 feet above the water on three concrete-filled legs.

Easy Northwest Growth Said Over

Portland — (U.P.) — The Pacific Northwest's period of easy growth is past, a Seattle banker warned today at the closing business session of the Inland Empire Waterways association convention here.

Miner H. Baker, vice-president of the Seattle First National bank, said "many of us have been deluding ourselves in recent years about the progress of our region. We have accepted rather uncritically the thesis that the West is a unit and that all the West, including the Pacific Northwest, is borne along on a tide of inevitable motion." Baker said that real progress has been made. But he said much of the prosperity has been traceable to big federal appropriations. He said also that the rate of growth has slowed down markedly.
