Acree Reserve Plan Said Decided

Portland (U.P.) — The government may pay farmers to keep land out of production to help bolster farm income, it was reported today.

The Oregonian quoted "Washington insiders" as saying Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson has decided on the acreage reserve plan with a hope of winning farmer support in 1956.

As signs of the possibility, the newspaper said the Oregon Wheat Growers League had called a special meeting at Arlington Tuesday to discuss the proposal. Also, the president's agricultural advisory commission, which includes Dr. G. Burton Wood of Oregon State College, has been called to Washington next week, the newspaper added.
