### SOC Teacher Has Article Published

Ashland—Miss Florence P. Allen, associate professor of education at Southern Oregon college, is the author of an article published in the November issue of the College of Education Record printed by the University of Washington on a quarterly basis.

Her article, "An Experiment with the Cycle Plan in Intermediate Grades at the Southern Oregon College of Education," is based upon a study centered around 16 children who remained with the same teacher through a three year period and a like number who had a different teacher each year.

Comments of parents were generally favorable regarding the group having the same teacher for three years though a number expressed the opinion that a two year continuity plan would avoid molding the child too much to the special interests of the teacher.

The study indicated that the children in the three year group under one teacher seemed to have made greater growth scholastically, socially, and emotionally than did the control group with a different teacher each year.
