

Brownell Asked If Cain To Be Disqualified In Seattle Hearing

Washington — (U.P.) — The Subversive Activities Control Board has asked Attorney General Herbert Brownell Jr. whether he wants former Sen. Harry P. Cain disqualified from sitting in judgment on an alleged Communist-front group.

The board said last night that Cain, a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board, has been presiding at the hearings in Seattle, Wash. The board is seeking to determine whether the pension group is a "Communist front" organization required to register with the government, as charged by Brownell.

Both the Justice Department and the Washington Pension Union, the alleged Red-front, have agreed that "no bias or prejudice" has been shown in Cain's conduct of hearings on the group "thus far."

Cain has been sharply critical of the Administration's security risk program for government employees, which was drawn up by Brownell.

In a formal notice to the pension group and Brownell, the board asked whether it should treat Brownell's latest move "as a motion . . . to disqualify member Cain."

Washington. In questioning the timeliness of Brownell's action, the board also noted that both the Justice Department and pension union "acquiesced in going forward with the hearing . . . which is apparently now in its final stage."

Brownell yesterday formally asked the board to consider an abandoned bid by the pension union to disqualify Cain on grounds of bias and prejudice. The pension group later changed its mind and said it was satisfied Cain would give it an "impartial hearing."

Cain has been sharply critical of the Administration's security risk program for government employees, which was drawn up by Brownell.

Jurors in Fong Trial Holiday Guests of County

Portland — (U.P.) — Jurors hearing the Fong murder trial were guests of Multnomah county today as the drawn-out case stretched through the Thanksgiving holiday and the court refused to allow the jury to return home.

Yesterday's session had appeared to mark the end of the legal wrangling between Circuit Judge Alfred R. Dobson and prosecuting attorneys that has characterized the trial. But in the final moments the arguments flared and Judge Dobson threatened to cite Deputy District Attorney Howard Lonergan with contempt of court.

Third State Attempt
The trial is the third in the state's attempt to convict Mrs. Sherry Fong of the murder of 16-year-old Diane Hank. Also accused but to be tried later is the woman's husband, Wey Him Fong.

Yesterday's outbreak came when Lonergan attempted to read some of Mrs. Fong's testimony given in an earlier trial. Judge Dobson ruled that such testimony was inadmissible but Lonergan attempted to argue the point.

Judge Dobson said "you'd better drop it right now." **Conduct Contemptuous**
When Lonergan attempted to cite precedent, Judge Dobson interrupted and said "Mr. Lonergan, I want to say right here and now that the conduct of you and the district attorney in this case is contemptuous. Statements you have put in the press are wholly unwarranted and wholly defective."

Lonergan was gavelled to silence again a few moments later and Judge Dobson said "I might have to hold you in contempt." Defense attorney Irvin Goodman said Mrs. Fong would take the stand in her own defense, probably Monday. The state expects to call its last witness tomorrow.
