SCIENCE AT WORK

New York — (U.P.)—One of the two doctors was dying, but they ignored that. Nothing could be done about it—death was inevitable. So they discussed the hidden structures and sub-structures and super-structures of the human mind.

Naturally, since both doctors of medicine were psychiatrists, they were "oriented"—a favored word of scientists—to psychoanalysis. One of the doctors was Edmund Bergler, who has international standing as a psychoanalytic theorist; the other was Theodore Branfman.

Branfman is dead now, but Bergler has published the result of their scientific collaboration in the technical journal, *The American Imago*. That Branfman had death as well as science in his mind while the work was being formulated, is stated in a footnote.

Perfection Impossible
What the two doctors discussed was why some human beings seek perfection when the whole experience of the race is that perfection does not exist. They not only concluded that perfectionists are, by and large, neurotics, but drew up some of the specifications of the neurotic illness.

In this, they pointed out, they were not out of step with recorded scientific thought, even that predating the work of Sigmund Freud, the developer of psychoanalysis.

They quoted Alfred de Musset, (who died in 1857): "The desire to possess it (perfection) is the most dangerous kind of madness." And the Marquis Louis Fantanes, (who died in 1821): "The desire for perfection is the worst disease that ever afflicted the human mind."

This writer, in seeking to reduce to a limited number of simple words the technical complexities of their formulations, runs the risk of misrepresenting by omissions, and the reader is asked to keep that in mind. This, then, is their idea—backed by copious citations from the scientific literature of psychoanalysis. **Psychic Masochism**
Unconsciously, the perfectionist enjoys suffering—"psychic masochism." The tyrannical

Hollywood — (U.P.)—Ava Gardner started to divorce Frank Sinatra a year and a half ago but hasn't gotten around to it, and now the crooner is showering his wife with gifts, letters and telephone calls again.



It's been 18 months since Ava established residence in Nevada for a divorce. She took off to live in Europe without filing suit. Hollywood has labeled their estrangement one of the longest in film-town history, and pals are wondering what will happen to the couple whose romance, marriage and break-up made headlines for four years.

Now He's Attentive
For more than a year the two were on unfriendly terms. But recently Frankie has been more attentive to his estranged wife. One friend of Ava's who recently returned from a visit with her in Madrid says, "They are much friendlier now than they used to be. But what will happen, I don't know. They may get together." Other pals of the couple insist, "They're just friends and nothing more."

After Ava cracked up her fancy foreign car last summer, Frankie wired her twice. He also shipped over his last year's Cadillac for her to use.

This week the singer mailed a \$125-plus-tax-jeweled sweater to Ava for Christmas. When the actress' sister, Bea, left last week for Madrid, she took along two other boxes for Ava from the crooner.

Recently a movie trade paper itemed, "Hold onto your hats—Frankie called Ava last night." At first Ava did not file for divorce because Frankie refused to part with any alimony.

"The money thing never was settled, and she felt she was due something for various expenditures she had made. That held up the divorce," the pal said. 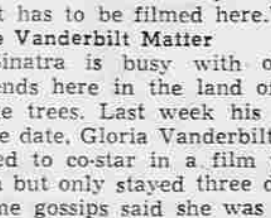
