Dallas, Tex. — (U.P.) — Texas Christian university will meet the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss) in the Cotton Bowl on Jan. 2.

Felix McKnight, president of the Cotton Bowl Athletic associ-

ation, announced Ole Miss' selection last night, after Ole Miss bested Mississippi State, 26-0.

That gave Ole Miss a 9-1 record for the season. TCU's only loss was to Texas A&M. TCU won the Southwest Conference championship Saturday with a 20-13 victory over its traditional enemy, Southern Methodist university, in Fort Worth, Tex.

Initiative Petition for Closing Coastal Streams to Commercial Fishing Brings Hot Discussion

Bend—(U.P.)—An initiative petition to close all Oregon coastal streams south of the Columbia river to commercial fishing for salmon and steelhead came in for some heated discussion Friday at opening of the Oregon Izaak Walton League here.

Rollin E. Bowles, Portland attorney and legal adviser for the state Izaak Walton, told a panel discussion group that a fluctuating resource such as fish cannot be managed by fixed legislation.

He said spawning areas would support only so many fish and insisted it would be "utter folly

to allow these spawning beds to become gutted with salmon and steelhead."

Stanton was unable to be present and his paper was read by William Niskanen of Bend.

The Roseburg editor in his statement said "a great deal of fuss" was being made by commercial fishermen about a very small amount of production. He said, however, the fish runs which were "in danger of extreme depletion" were valuable in many other respects.

Gold beavers for top achievements in conservation in 1955 were presented to Herbert Lundy, associate editor of the Oregonian; Prof. R. E. Dimick, head of the Department of Fish and Game at Oregon State College, and L. C. (Jack) Binford of Portland.
