Plans Being Made for Spring PTA Convention

Plans are already being formed for the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers convention to be held in Eugene, April 17, 18, and 19.

This year's emphasis will be placed on PTA techniques, and 13 workshops on the subject have been set up. Facilities of the University of Oregon, particularly Erb Memorial building, will be used for workshops and exhibits, and the Eugene high school auditorium for general sessions. The Eugene hotel will serve as registration headquarters.

Attendance is expected to reach 1,300. On April 16, the day preceding the conference, the state executive committee, board of managers, and presidents of county councils will hold meetings.
