Farmers May Renew Leases For Four Years

Washington—(U.P.)—The Interior department has announced that farmers leasing lands on the Klamath Reclamation projects in California may renew their leases for four years in the future. The department said the new policy is intended to "promote good soil conservation practices" on the lands. The lands are leased in tracts ranging up to 160 acres in size. 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Farm Woodlots Said Important in Program Of Renewing Forests

Salem—Farmers and owners of small tracts of forest lands may hold the key to half the problem of growing a new crop of trees, according to Charles H. Ladd, chief forester for the state forestry department. "The small woodland owners hold over 4,900,000 acres of our finest commercial timberlands", Ladd said. This represents over 50 per cent of the privately owned forest lands of the state. Over 35,000 different owners are involved, the forester pointed out. He warned the treatment these lands receive will have a great influence on the future forest economy of the state. Ladd reported that an estimated 4 billion board feet of timber was harvested from these small "woodlands" in 1954. Whether or not a new forest crop can be harvested from these small holdings depends upon the owner and his forestry program. **Must Offset Losses** "The timber from the farm woodlands must meet part of our future needs and offset losses resulting from fire, insects and disease," the forester reported. Blind Craftsmen File Brief With Thornton

Salem—(U.P.)—Blind craftsmen who are employed in a state workshop in Portland Saturday presented a brief to Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton in their attempt to win state retirement and social security benefits. The workers recently were granted state industrial accident insurance after an initial ruling by Thornton that they were not state employees had cut off the benefits. The blind workers, through Attorney Burl Green, contended they were not "inmates of a state institution" in the sense intended by the law. Thornton has said he believes the law deprives them of the right to retirement benefits.
