Kay Boyles Denies Red Party Link

Washington — (U.P.) — Novelist Kay Boyle swore yesterday that she never has been a member of the Communist party.

She testified that in 1949 she sent contributions to two conferences which Senate investigators said were sponsored by groups on the attorney general's list of subversive organizations. However, she said she never belonged to the two groups.

The prize-winning writer appeared before the Senate Constitutional Rights Subcommittee in defense of her husband, Joseph M. Frankenstein, who was fired by the State Department as a security risk.

One of the charges against Frankenstein was that Miss Boyle was a Communist from 1940 to 1944.

Thornton Fails To Get OLCC Records

Salem — (U.P.) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton yesterday failed again in his fight to get records of a state liquor commission investigation.

Circuit Judge George R. Duncan ruled against Thornton's suit by sustaining an Oregon Liquor Control Commission demurrer.

Although the ruling, in effect, dismissed his case, the attorney general said he might amend his complaint in another effort to get the investigation records.

Last Friday, Marion County Circuit Court turned down his petition to force turning over of depositions of the investigation.

The depositions, taken by Portland attorney Robert Maguire, involved accusations of irregular conduct among certain employees of the liquor commission.

CIO, Weyerhaeuser To Extend Contracts

Tacoma — (U.P.) — The International Woodworkers of America, CIO, and Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. today announced that an agreement has been reached extending contracts between the union and the company to June 1, 1956.

Officials said the agreement is subject to ratification by the employees involved.

Effective Dec. 1, 1955, there will be a wage increase of 4 1/2 per cent to all employees; a 200-hour reduction in the hours of work required to be eligible for a vacation and certain liberalization of holiday benefits for disabled employees.

In addition, a pension plan financed by the company will become effective June 1, 1957.

Some 7000 employees are affected. Although the agreement runs to June 1, 1958, there is provision for a wage reopening on June 1, 1957.

Survey Shows Marked Increase in Lawyers

Chicago — (U.P.) — A survey by the American Bar Association shows a marked increase in the number of lawyers in the United States.

The study showed 241,514 licensed lawyers this year, compared with 221,605 in 1952, an increase of almost 20,000 in the three-year period.

Almost 200,000 of the attorneys now practicing attended law school before passing the bar examination, compared with 170,000 in the 1952 survey.

More than 85 per cent of those who went to law school got degrees. Many states now require law degrees before bar examinations, compared with 170,000 in the 1952 survey.

More than half the lawyers in the country (127,389) are in individual private practice, the study showed; 51,668 are in partnerships and 10,866 are associates.

Women lawyers number 5,036, less than three per cent of the national total.
