The Bulldogs of Fresno and the Pirates of Whitworth each drew three places on the first team. Fresno State players were end Darryl Rogers, tackle Alan Kirchoff and back Dean Philpott. Whitworth was represented by center Bill Vanderstoep, guard Walt Spangenberg and back Bob Bates.

They were the only schools of the more than 30 with nominations to gain more than one place.

Portland —(U.P.)— Open season on the Pacific Brant, the elite of waterfowl opens in Oregon tomorrow and will continue through Feb. 10.

The black brant is the smallest and darkest of American geese. The State Game commission said today they are rarely hunted and difficult to bag. They are found only along the Pacific coast and are seldom seen far from the ocean, marine estuaries or coastal meadows.

Bag limit is three birds per day or in possession.
