## Birth of Quads Surprises Parents; One Fights for Life

Alma, Ga.—(UP)—One of the quadruplets born to a surprised farm couple fought for its life today, aided by a dozen off-duty nurses who refused to quit their posts.

Dr. W. W. Sharpe, who delivered the quads yesterday afternoon, said Nos. 1 and 2, both girls, were doing nicely and No. 2, a boy, was in "fair condition." But No. 4, another girl, caused concern.

**Wonderful Cooperation**  
"She is not doing well at all," he said, "but we're doing everything we can to save her. I have never seen such wonderful cooperation—way beyond the call of duty."

Sharpe explained that 12 or 15 day-shift nurses worked around the clock to help the hard pressed night staff of the small hospital. All the babies were kept in incubators.

**Three Pounds Each**  
The four babies weigh about three pounds each, were born to Mrs. E. W. Nelson, 34, within about 20 minutes after being brought to the hospital by her husband from their home near Douglas, about 20 miles from here.

"What in the world are we going to do to take care of them all," she said on learning the infant she expected to bear was actually a foursome. She already had borne seven children, six of them surviving.

"It looks like we've just got more than we can handle," Nelson, 36, told Sharpe after recovering from his own amazement.

Salem—(UP)—Motorists traveling over Santiam pass were advised to carry chains today. The State Highway Department said three inches of new snow fell in the area.
