Switzerland Willing To Act as Mediator

Bern, Switzerland — (U.P.) — President Max Petitpierre said Tuesday night his tiny country is willing to act as mediator in an effort to end the East-West split that two Geneva conferences failed to heal.

He said the Geneva spirit turned out to be "artificial" but that the latest Big Four conference at least was able to "re-establish reality before the eyes of the world."

"Thus," the Swiss president said, "it was not a pure failure." Petitpierre said Switzerland was willing to try to bring East and West together "because if a small country should try to stay out of quarrels which divide the big powers, it still bears its part of the responsibility" for the state of international relations.

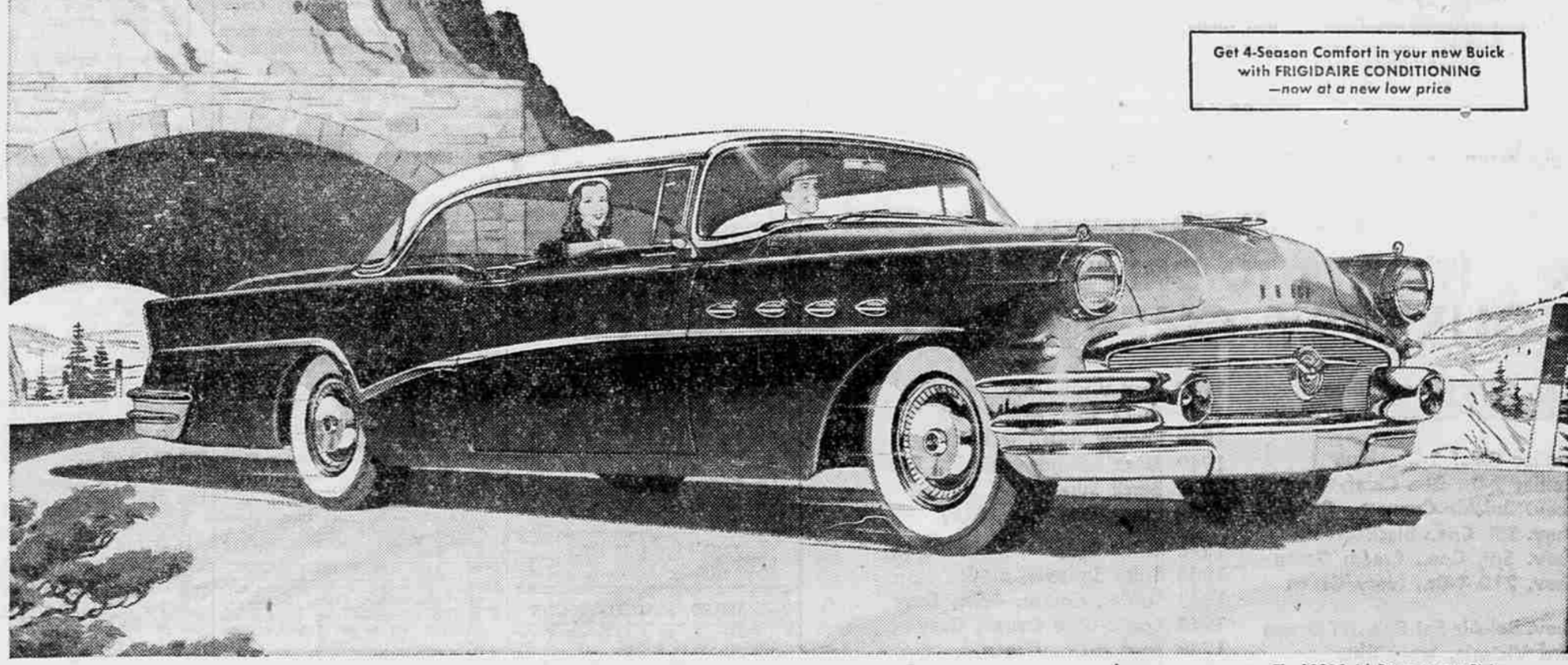

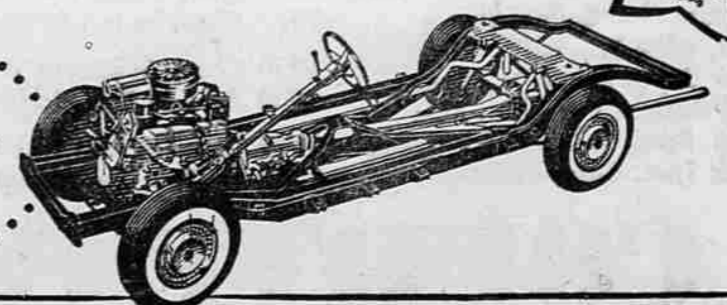
