General Strike Staged in Rome

Rome (U.P.)—Communist-led workers staged a general strike in the Rome area that had little effect last night.

The walkout of workers in the Communist-led Chamber of Labor started at 3 p.m. to protest a recent police crackdown on demonstrating construction employees.

But three non-Communist unions stayed on the job, and the effect of the walkout was reduced almost to zero by two other main factors:

1. Rome's public transport union made a last-minute decision to work today. They planned instead to stage a separate hour and a half strike Thursday.
2. State printers, gas and electricity workers and some other service workers decided to strike at hours more convenient to themselves, thus breaking the mass impact of the walkout.

Way Cleared for New Portland Hotel

Portland (U.P.)—The way has been cleared for final negotiations on a proposal for a \$6,000,000 "highway-suburban" hotel in Portland.

Incorporation papers were filed at Salem for the Portland Sheraton Corporation, a subsidiary of the nationwide Sheraton hotel chain of Boston. The articles listed 100 shares of no par value stock.

The hotel would be located on a four block area on the Lloyd tract just north of the Department of Interior building. Preliminary architectural plans have been completed, and Sheraton and Lloyd officials were scheduled to meet in New York next week to integrate the hotel into the proposed Lloyd center.

The hotel would have 350 rooms at first, but later would be expanded to a total of 550 rooms. A Sheraton official said the structure would have many motel features.

Milwaukie Armory Land Site Opposed

Salem (U.P.)—Congressman Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) has served notice that he will oppose acquisition of land in the Kellogg Park area of Milwaukie, Ore., by the Army and any proposed construction of an Army armory in the area.

Norblad wrote Rep. Carl Vinson, Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee that the Kellogg Park land should be returned to the tax rolls and made available for industry.

He said, "There are many alternate sites which can be acquired by the Army on land in the Portland metropolitan area which are much less valuable

and which will serve the purpose just as well."

He added: "I wish to further advise that I will continue to oppose this project at any hearings which may be held before our committee."

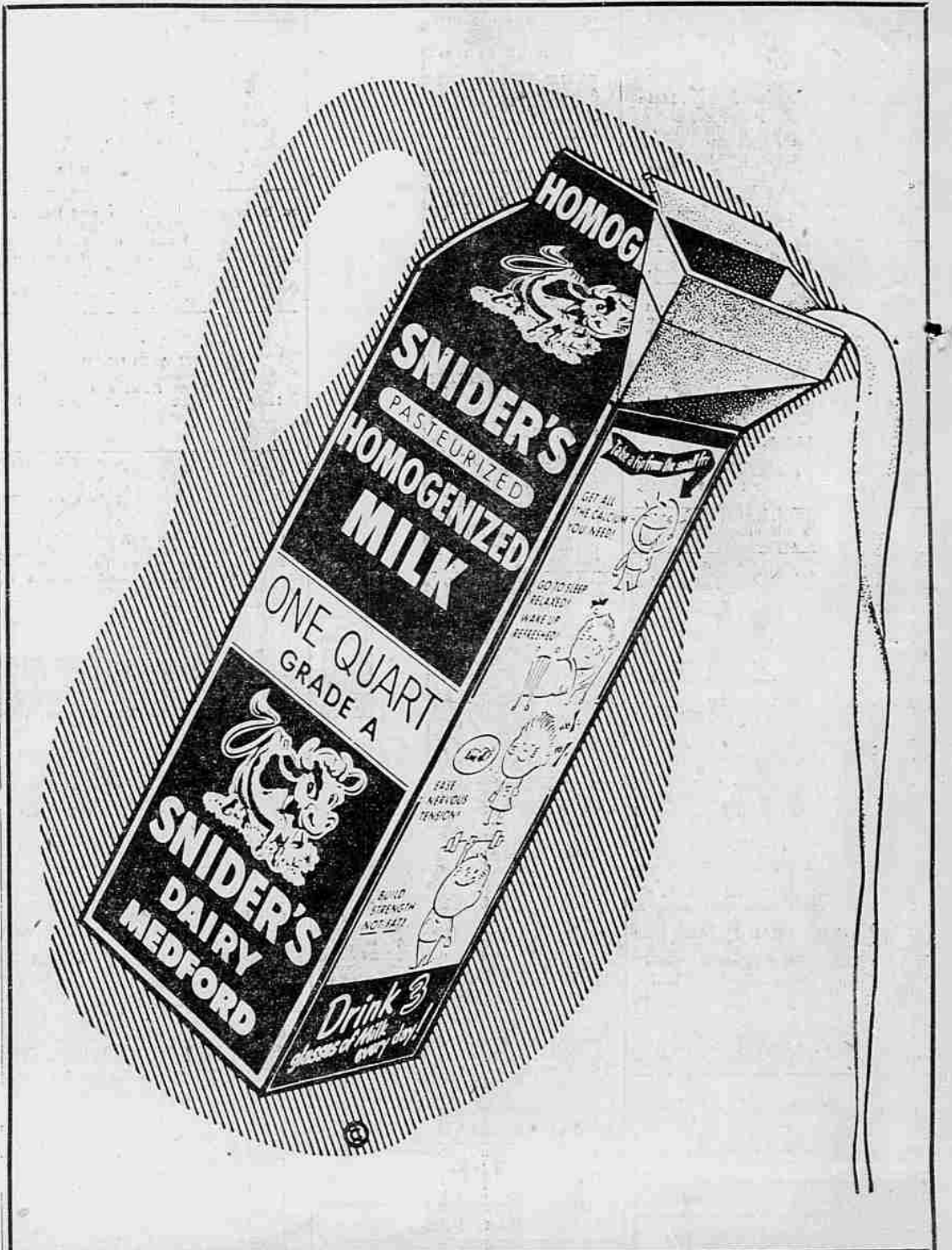

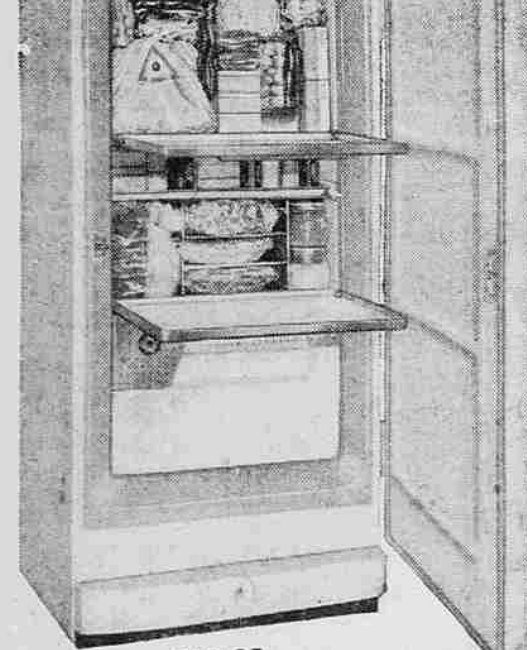
