Calcutta, India—Communist Party Chief Nikita Khrushchev, speaking at a banquet attended by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India:

"India and Russia have joined hands to rid the world of colonialism."

Calcutta, India—Prime Minister Nehru speaking at the same banquet after Khrushchev finished an attack on Western disarmament plans:

"I also am opposed to armament, but I have no right to criticize others if they follow their own way. We only want to stay away from them."

New York—Dr. Alberto Gainza Paz, before leaving for Buenos Aires to resume ownership of the newspaper La Prensa, confiscated four-and-a-half years ago by deposed dictator Juan D. Peron:

"I never lost faith that it would be returned to me. My friends, associates and the Argentine people never lost faith, and I think it is a wonderful encouragement to the people of the Iron Curtain countries."

Washington—Tammany Hall Democratic leader Carmine De Sapio, in announcing that New York delegates to the 1956 Democratic National Convention will place the name of Gov. Averell Harriman in nomination:

"It is foolhardy to try to guess what the people will think or want in the way of a candidate more than eight months from now."

Chicago—Republican National Chairman Leonard Hall, answering criticism that GOP leaders are pushing President Eisenhower in an effort to get him to run again:

"The President does only what his doctors permit him to do."

U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Henry Cabot Lodge, replied to Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister V. V. Kusnetsov who cited American newspaper columnists on the U.S. disarmament position:

"We haven't got iron discipline on everybody in America. That, I might say, is an understatement."

Gettysburg, Pa.—An unidentified doctor in a medical bulletin on the health of President Eisenhower:

"The President, on progressively increasing but restricted activities, remains free of symptoms."

She's decided the time has come to settle down with an old-fashioned-type American husband.

"I am ready to get married," she said in that lilting accent. "Maybe I should advertise—I have a house, diamonds and money in the bank!"

In this case the "lonely hearts" applicant is beautiful, blonde, sharp, rich, age unknown.

Actors Rejected

Any applicants for the job must be home-grown. Zsa Zsa wants to live in America. And actors need not apply.

"No actors," continued Zsa Zsa.

"I want a man who will be a good father to my daughter, a nice settled-down man. No more glamour."

She wants a man who "gets up in the morning and goes to work and then comes home at night. This lets out international playboy Porfirio Rubirosa, whom Zsa Zsa has been speculating for many editions about marrying.

"I'm tired of being alone and my child needs a father," she said. "I have four suitors now—including a Texan who has one-hundred million dollars—but I'm so busy with my career I don't have much time to date."
