

### Russian Leaders Arrive in Burma

Rangoon, Burma—(U.P.)—Russia's roving leaders arrived here today from India for a week's tour of Burma and ran into protocol arrangements a couple of notches lower than those accorded Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia on his recent visit.

Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist party secretary Nikita Khrushchev landed at Rangoon's Migaladon Airport to a cheery welcome from flag-waving Burmese and a handshake from Premier U Nu.

But they rated only a 19-gun salute where Tito received a 21-gun salute on his visit.

The Russians also had to drive 11 miles from the airport to Rangoon to meet Burmese President Dr. Pa U although the President was on hand personally to greet the Yugoslavian leader whose visit generated far more excitement.

### Betty Hutton Forced To Cancel TV Show

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Betty Hutton was listed today as the third performer in less than a week to be forced off a national television show by illness.

The singer-actress informed NBC yesterday she would not be able to appear on next Saturday night's Jimmy Durante program because of an attack of influenza.

Earlier this week Milton Berle was forced to withdraw from his own show because of "extreme exhaustion." Last Friday Eddie Cantor, scheduled as a guest on Berle's show, suffered a kidney ailment and also had to cancel his appearance.

### School for Deer Hunters Successful

Sacramento, Calif.—(U.P.)—California now requires that all deer hunters under the age of 16 go to hunting school, and the new law has paid off in lives saved.

The department of fish and game reported that statistics from last year's hunting seasons showed trained junior hunters were 19 times as safe as the untrained juniors in the field.

Any youngster planning a hunting trip has to pass the prescribed four-hour training course. The course conducted by the department consists of lectures in safety, hunting law, and gun handling. On graduation, the young hunter gets a certificate of competence in handling firearms, which he must present before a license can be issued to him.

### Rainfall in Italy Found Radioactive

Genoa, Italy—(U.P.)—Rain falling on northern Italy is four times more radioactive than is normal, a University of Genoa spokesman said Wednesday night.

The spokesman said geiger counter tests carried out by the university medical clinic laboratory showed 1,930 impulses per liter of rainwater.

The clinic said the high rate of radioactivity was not dangerous from the biological point of view.
