

Cage Upsets Mark Start

A round basketball can take bounces just as funny as an egg shaped football, and so the college basketball season started with Notre Dame, Wisconsin, and Fordham suffering upsets that should be a warning to national champion San Francisco.

These were the "shockers" as the Dec. 1 curtain went up on the court season Thursday night: Detroit dumping Notre Dame, 77-71; Butler nipping Wisconsin, 67-63; and St. Joseph's of Philadelphia drubbing Fordham, 89-74.

NCS Victor
North Carolina State, No. 4 nationally and Dayton, No. 6, scored easy wins against their giant All-American candidates tested out the new rule that widened the free throw lanes to 12 feet this season.

N.C. State cruised to an 88-63 decision over Florida State. Dayton was held to a 28-23 halftime edge by Pepperdine but ran wild in the second half for a 75-35 win.

Medford City School's Saturday Recreation Programs Will Start

Saturday recreation schedule for boys in the Medford public school system will begin Saturday, Dec. 3, at the various gymnasiums.

Except for a pause during the Christmas vacation period the Saturday program will be conducted morning and afternoon through March 11 with coaches and physical education instructors in charge at each school.

Activities will begin this Saturday at McLoughlin and Hedrick junior high schools and Jackson, Lincoln, Roosevelt, Washington and Jefferson grade schools. The senior high school gym, however will be closed to recreation activity this week end.

Basketball leagues will be set up at the senior high by Lee Ragsdale, physical education supervisor. Regularly scheduled games will start on Dec. 10. Only senior high students are eligible.

Varied Activities
At the junior highs there will be basketball instruction and intramural games. Tumbling, volleyball, badminton or other activity suited to the groups are planned.

Grade schools will have informal competition in basketball, volleyball and other games appropriate to the groups. There will be occasional challenge games against teams from other schools. Special contest plays, free play and basket shooting are on the program.

Boys will be divided into similar age groups for informal games to avoid injury and to avoid smaller boys from being crowded out.

Gyms will be open from 10 a.m. to noon and 1 to 3 p.m. on Saturdays, December 17 will be the last Saturday of activity before Christmas and programs will be resumed on Jan. 7.

Exception is Lincoln gym which will be unavailable mornings once each month.

Hawkeyes, Illini Rated Big 10 Best

Chicago (U.P.)—Defending Champion Iowa and experienced Illinoi probably will run a neck and neck race for the Big Ten basketball title this year with Notre Dame and Marquette likely to be the top regional independents in national championship contention.

The Hawkeyes lack only three men from last year's squad which went to the national semifinals. Big Ten coaches rated

them either as the top club again, or placed Iowa about on a par with Illinois.

Notre Dame lost only one player guard Junior Stephens, and Coach Johnny Jordan expected that sophomore Bobby Devine would take up the slack. Marquette has most of its starters back.

Big Ten coaches generally believed that Michigan State and Indiana would be the major threats to the Hawkeyes and Illini. The Spartans, still have Julius McCoy plus some good sophomores. Indiana may have to rely on standout performances from sophomores Archie Dees, Jerry Thompson and Charlie Osborn.

Every other Big Ten team boasts at least one potential star. Ohio State gets star point maker Robin Freeman back. Michigan could turn into a tartar should Ran Kramer round into shape in a hurry.

Minnesota will miss Chuck

Mencel and Dick Garmaker but has gigantic Bill Simonovich. Northwestern could get height from Bill Schulz and good performances from Dick Mast and Glen Lose.

Purdue's Ray Eddy believes Erich Barnes and Lamar Lundy from the football team could help his club, while Wisconsin, with a problem in height, expected a "fine group of sophomores" to press the veterans and improve the team.

Portland—The first elk hunt to be held in the Mill Creek watershed for many years brought only fair results to the hunter, the Oregon Game Commission said today.

According to Dave Luman, game agent for the Pendleton district, only 141 permit holders checked into the Mill Creek area and returned with 54 elk for a success ratio of 38 per cent.

The elk taken included 14 bulls, 24 cows, and 16 calves.

Bad weather was blamed for the mediocre showing in this area of high elk concentrations, with hunters plagued by pouring rain, impassable roads, and finally a blinding blizzard.

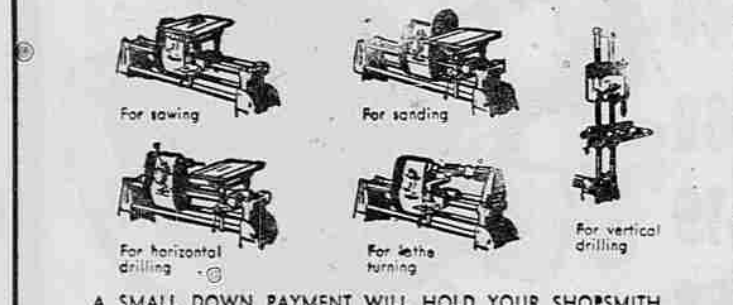

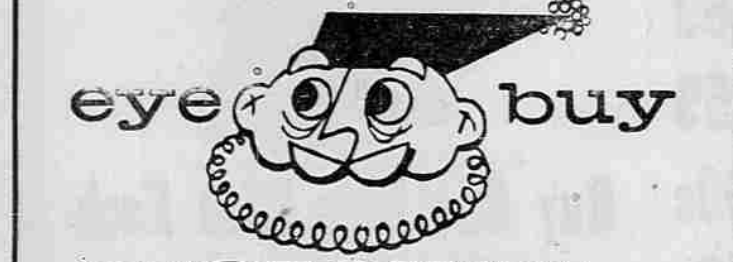
