Nazarene Officer To Be Here Sunday; Series To Continue

Members of the Medford Church of the Nazarene will hear one of the five general superintendents in their church when Dr. Hardy C. Powers speaks in the morning worship service next Sunday. He will be accompanied by the Oregon-Pacific district superintendent, the Rev. W. D. McGraw Jr., who will address the adult Sunday school department at 9:45 a.m.

Dr. Powers has for 12 years been one of the officials making up the board of general superintendents for the denomination. He is a world traveler and had under his supervision missionary work in various parts of the world. The Church of the Nazarene conducts missionary work in 26 countries.

Portland Rabbi Contrasts Jewish, Christian Ideas

Ashtland—Jewish and Christian religions were contrasted and compared by Rabbi J. Nodel of Temple Beth Israel in Portland, at Southern Oregon college Wednesday.

Rabbi Nodel said he believed in avoiding controversial discussions, but added he could not speak in a vacuum and that due to religious differences in assemblies it was almost impossible to do so.

He ended with a plea for tolerance and understanding, and for fluidity of all religions in their adjustment to the complexities of modern times.

Basic Differences
His interpretation of basic differences between Jew and Christian, in their beliefs, concerned varying degrees of preoccupation with the hereafter exhibited by both. He pointed out it was not until comparatively recently that Christians have tended to draw away from the concept that life was in itself only a preparation for death and that in adversity the tendency has been for the Christian to comfort himself with the thoughts of a better life in the hereafter when he was confronted with a series of calamities in the present.

In contrast, Rabbi Nodel averred that the Jewish interpretation always has been a concern with the present. He pointed out that a Jew was much more concerned with making a better world while it is "yet day" and that "the whole is greater than the sum of its parts—in that we, as Jews, believe in the betterment of the group rather than the individual."

More Social Religion
Rabbi Nodel advanced his belief that Christianity is beginning to preach a more social religion, and that it is rediscovering itself and returning more and more to fundamental tenets of Judaism and the Old Testament from which the Christian religion draws its source and inspiration.
