

Eisenhower Goes Hunting; Results Not Disclosed

Gettysburg, Pa. — (U.P.)—President Eisenhower went hunting Saturday, presumably for crows. But his luck, if any, was not immediately disclosed.

He took to the fields on a bright, sunny afternoon even as the society of prevention of cruelty to old crows—in a good-natured letter—urged him to go easy on crows.

With his driver, Dick Flohr, and two other Secret Service men in tow, Mr. Eisenhower donned a plaid jacket, golf cap, and tan pants, put his gun over his shoulder, and worked his way along a hedge-row separating two of his fields.

Then he moved out across the fields, which recently have been dotted with crows.

An observer who passed along a back road close by saw none of the much-maligned birds at the moment. She did see, a quarter of a mile down the road, a covey of pheasant.

Pheasant, however, have been out of season here since Nov. 28. So have rabbits. Buck deer can be shot now but the President isn't likely to find any on his well-tended acres.

Nobody could say for sure that's what the President was hunting. Everything from blue jays to snowy owls can be hunted here anytime. So can small animals like chipmunks, woodchucks and skunks.

However, crows have been settling on farms hereabouts by the thousands in recent days. Mr. Eisenhower's place has had its full share.

Champion Steer Victim of Strike

Chicago — (U.P.) — Julius, the grand champion steer of the International Livestock Exposition had its first airplane flight halted last night by a labor dispute.

The 990-pound Aberdeen Angus valed at \$16,125 was to have flown to New York on a United Air Lines cargo plane. But AFL teamsters, refused to cross picket lines set up by flight engineers striking against United.

Julius was shunted to a New York Central freight train leaving here shortly after midnight.

A spokesman for Howard Johnson, who purchased the steer, said Julius would arrive in New York about 4 a.m. Monday morning, three hours before the steer is scheduled to appear on the television show, "Today." He said Nancy Turner, 16, of Champaign, Ill., owner of the steer would fly as scheduled.

Ship Commission Requests Funds

Salem — (U.P.) — Chairman Harry Williams of the Battleship Oregon commission Friday asked the State Emergency board for an appropriation of \$13,308 and threatened court action when he was turned down.

The commission was cut off with no funds by the 1953 Legislature. Williams said that it was "deplorable" that "one patriotic citizen" was asked to carry on the work of the state agency. He said he had spent \$600 of his own funds for commission work.

Williams charged that the Legislature had illegally transferred \$8,500 in commission funds into the general fund. He said the money was given to the commission by the Navy when certain relics from the battleship were taken over by the commission.

Bandits Fire Shot After Safeway Holdup

Portland — (U.P.) — Two young bandits last night held up a Portland Safeway store and one of them fired a shot at a store employee as he fled out the front door.

Store officials refused to say how much money was taken.

A clerk, Jack Metcalf, said he saw a youth 18 to 19 years old "fooling with the till" that was attended by Juanita Scott. When Metcalf started toward Miss Scott's cash register station, the thieves ran but one turned and fired a gun at Metcalf. No one was hurt although the store was crowded with customers at the time.

Two clerks chased the robbers about five blocks but lost them. Miss Scott said the young bandit was accompanied by an older man, "heavy set, about 35."

Millionaire's Wife Involved in Plot

Chicago — (U.P.) — The wife of a millionaire was involved Saturday in an extortion plot against officials in his insurance company, but police refused to explain what they believed her role in the conspiracy to be.

The woman is Mrs. Mary Cole, 41, wife of Robert A. (King) Cole, head of Chicago Metropolitan Mutual Insurance company. The firm lists \$7,000,000 in assets and policies worth \$73,000,000 in force.

Mrs. Cole was brought in felony court Friday on two charges of conspiracy to extort involving Horace G. Hall, secretary of the company, and James D. Grantham, general manager. She denied any knowledge of the threats which the two officials said caused them to pay \$21,900.

Lt. Ralph D. Potacque, who heads the confidence game squad, said the money paid to extortionists may run as high as \$150,000.

Dulles Says Import Quotas Blow to Trade

Washington — (U.P.) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said Saturday a congressional bill to fix import quotas on Japanese textiles would strike a "serious blow" at the administration's trade program.

He expressed this view in a letter to Sen. Margaret Chase Smith, who had protested to Dulles in a letter Nov. 21 against the volume of textile imports from Japan.

The bill to fix quotas on the imports is sponsored by more than 60 senators.

Dulles wrote that he personally has asked Japanese government officials for restraint on their textile exports to this country. He said Japan is working out such controls.

Transmission Lines From Dam Completed

Portland — (U.P.) — All major transmission line carrying McNary dam power westward will be completed today with the energization of two sections of the McNary-Santiam 287,000-volt line No. 2.

Dr. William A. Pearl, Bonneville Power administrator, said the 104-mile McNary-Maupin and 23-mile Detroit-Santiam sections of the line will be put into operation today.

Dr. Pearl said initial energization of all circuits at 230,000 volts will carry present McNary generation of 805,000 kilowatts and later conversion of higher voltages will provide additional

capacity for remaining generator installations.

The new McNarySantiam line and line No. 1, will carry 330,000 kilowatts of power to lower Willamette valley centers under the current 230,000 volt operation. Eventually 450,000 kilowatts will be carried when the line is operated at 297,000 volts.

Giant 230,000 to 345,000 volt auto-transformers are scheduled to be installed at McNary and Roks substation in July, 1956, giving the line a transmission capacity of over 450,000 kilowatts.
