

Indifference May Cause Epidemic Of Polio Next Summer

Portland—(U.P.)—Parental indifference may lead to another polio epidemic in Oregon next summer, according to the State Board of Health. The board announced Saturday that the federal government has asked the state to turn back more than half its available Salk anti-polio vaccine because Oregonians have neglected to use their allocated supplies.

Board members said they were at a loss to explain why Oregon parents remained indifferent to the vaccine since the state was among the first to report the new discovery 100 per cent effective.

Bipartisan Group To Meet Dec. 14; Called by Nixon

Washington—(U.P.)—Vice President Richard Nixon Saturday called the first meeting of the bipartisan commission set up by congress this year to investigate the government's controversial Loyalty-Security program.

Nixon, who said he acted at the request of President Eisenhower, set the meeting for Dec. 14 in the Senate office building.

In letters to the 12 public and private commission members, he said the group would elect a chairman and vice-chairman and "transact any other business its members deem advisable."

Democrats in Congress sponsored the legislation setting up the commission. It is authorized to study—and recommend—improvements in the basic personnel security laws, executive orders and agency regulations, and also practices followed in congressional investigations.

The Administration's Loyalty-Security program has been under heavy fire recently from two Democratic-controlled senate subcommittees.

A Senate Civil Service subcommittee is investigating the Administration's claims of the number of government workers fired as possible security risks—figures which Democrats charge are a GOP "Number Game"—designed to depict the Democratic party as allowing subversives to enter government.

Airborne Test of Atomic Plant Held

Washington—(U.P.)—Officials Saturday regarded the first airborne test involving an atomic power plant as an important advance in this country's race with Russia to develop an atom-powered plane.

It was announced Friday that an atomic reactor had been carried aloft for the first time by an Air Force B36 super bomber for experience with materials for protecting crews against radiation.

The reactor did not power the plane in the tests, which were understood to have been held at Fort Worth, Tex. The plane flew with conventional type engines and carried the nuclear reactor in a specially extended nose section.

Sources close to U.S. atomic developments have predicted that the first U.S. atomic plane will wing through the air some time in 1958-59. The first model is expected to fly about 600 miles an hour, with supersonic planes the eventual goal.

Among other things, the tests were designed to show how new materials stand up under heavy loads and stresses imposed on a plane at high altitudes and during maneuvers.

Roseburg High School Girl Named Head of Oregon TAP

Roseburg—(U.P.)—Sharon Lander, 16-year-old Roseburg High school senior, Saturday was named state chairman of the Teens Against Polio drive.

Tom Stoddard, Portland chairman of the state March of Dimes organization, said Sharon will coordinate all polio fundraising activities of Oregon youth. County TAP chairmen will be named later.

Sharon is recovering from an attack of polio last May, and is still on crutches. She is a straight A student, secretary of the student body and a member of many school clubs. She was May Fete princess this year.

Sharon's brother, Dale, 26, was stricken with polio last Nov. 2, and recently was transferred from an iron lung to a rocking bed at a Eugene hospital.

Started in Roseburg

Dr. Verner J. Anderson, chairman of the Douglas County Polio Foundation, said the national TAP program had its start in the Roseburg area five years ago. The national March of Dimes has sponsored the TAP for three years, but more emphasis is being given this year.

Dr. Anderson pointed out that Roseburg High school raised \$9,000 in the last MD drive, more than any other high school in the county. The school has raised more than \$17,000 for the March of Dimes in the last five years.

Douglas High school, at Brockway, has gained the distinction of raising more money per student for the March of Dimes than any other school in the county. The school last year raised nearly \$35,000 or \$7.50 per student.

In view of this, Dr. Anderson said, it was more than fitting that a Douglas county student should head the Oregon TAP program this year.

Three Killed When Freights Collide

Edensburg, Pa.—(U.P.)—Two Pennsylvania railroad diesel-powered freights crashed head-on on a spurline near here Saturday killing three crewmen and injuring four others.

Wilfred Barree, fireman of the northbound three-unit diesel, told hospital attendants both brains apparently received "clear track" signals as they approached each other on the Cresson branch between here and Bradley junction.

The two locomotives came together with tremendous impact. Both engineers and the fireman of the Southbound locomotive, which was hauling 20 loaded coal cars, died in the twisted wreckage of their cars.
