to 4 p.m. at the church. A Christmas program will be given December 18 at 7:30 p.m. and on Christmas day special services will be held at the church at 11 a.m.

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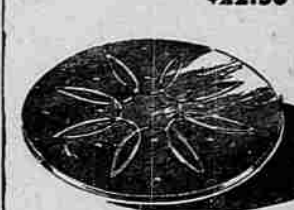
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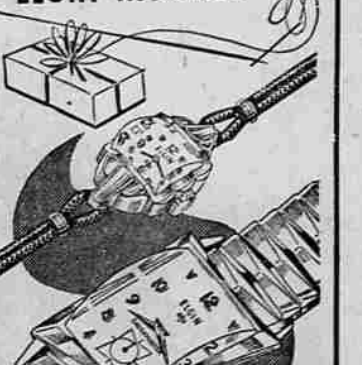


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
