The Medical Roundup

THE NEED FOR JUST A CHAT WITH A WISE PHYSICIAN

I see so many troubled persons who do not need and do not ask of me another complete and expensive examination. All that greatly needs is to sit down and tell me their troubles. Or, they want to get an interpretation of conflicting findings and opinions. After a thorough overhauling in a big clinic,



one man wanted to operate, while another advised strongly against surgery. Who was the poor puzzled patient to believe? Actually, great light was thrown on the problem by one more specialist test which somehow, someone had forgotten to order.

The other day, in came a distracted mother who wanted, not more examinations of her son; he had reacted normally enough to all the tests made by the good home physician; no, the mother, who knew what a bad-tempered, violent and difficult person her mildly epileptic husband had always been, wanted to talk to me her fears that her wayward, stubborn, ungracious and occasionally surly son had inherited a fitless type of epilepsy. She wondered if there was such a disease, and I could assure her that there is; it is common. We had a long chat, and then I sent her to my friend, Dr. Frederic Gibbs, for an electroencephalogram. This showed that the mother was right in her suspicions. Then, to her great joy, some dilatant given to the lad made him so much less irritable that at home and at school he became much easier to handle.

The other day I saw a sweet little secretary, with much sorrow in her eyes. She had had several costly examinations and a few operations that had not helped. Why hadn't they helped? Because a long chat with the girl brought out the strong probability that her aches and pains and partial paralyses were all due to the great unhappiness and feeling of "what is the use any more?" that came over her after her husband left her.

I asked, "How well would you get if the Fairy Prince were to come riding up on a white horse, and love you dearly, and marry you and build you a little home, and take you away from that noisy office, with its clattering typewriters?" And in a moment of frankness and clairvoyance, she said, "I'd be perfectly well."

No Test for Broken Heart
Why should a physician order more tests in such a case? There is no test that will reveal a broken and hopeless heart. I'll never forget the black-eyed Irish girl who came in one day complaining of sleeplessness, a dull headache, a backache, a loss of appetite, and some loss of weight. My associates had put her through many tests that had shown nothing. I asked her, "Have you had an overhauling like this before?" and she said, "Yes; I have had two." "Did they show anything?" "No."

I then asked the girl, "Why is there such sadness and hopelessness in your eyes?" She said, "My fiance left me two months ago, because, for a year, I had kept putting off our marriage. But I could not marry him because I have to support my parents. My father is an alcoholic who brings home no money for my mother, and hence I cannot and will not leave her. Because my beau cannot make enough to support her, he left, and ever since, I haven't slept; I just lie there in the dark and cry."

Arteriosclerosis
Many persons ask me, "Can't anything be done to cure arteriosclerosis?" And I have to reply that I do not know of any very hopeful treatment. I certainly do not know of any treatment that can open up and make ser-

vicable again arteries that have been closed by the disease. What is sad is that when a little artery plugs-up in the heart or brain, the bit of important tissue originally supplied with blood by that vessel is likely to die; and once dead, and turned into a scar, it can never be built back again.

At best, tissues about the scar will take over some of the work formerly done by the bit of tissue that died. In some cases it seems to help patients to give them a preparation of iodine, or it helps for 6 months or so to give some thyroid substance. Right after the plugging-up of an artery, it may help to give a drug which somewhat inhibits clotting. It may help for a few days right after the shock to give some cortisone; and later, if the patient is stout, it may help much to reduce weight. It may help much to stop heavy smoking.

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Detroit Strike Talks Finish in Deadlock

Detroit — (U.P.) — A lengthy meeting of stereotypers union officials and representatives of the city's three strikebound dailies ended late Saturday night in deadlock.

Another session was immediately set for 2 p.m. Monday with state and federal mediators. Robert C. Butz, executive secretary of the Detroit newspapers publishers association, said the union turned down flat a request that publication be resumed and "jobs be provided for idle employees."

Butz said union officials replied "no" to a suggestion that existing contracts be continued for 30 days while negotiations continue and that any increase granted be fully retroactive to the contract expiration on Nov. 30.
