x-ray unit at the hospital will be reopened as the need grows for the clinic. Meanwhile the Sacred Heart hospital x-ray clinic is open Thursday afternoons from 2 to 5 p.m. A small charge is made for the x-rays to cover cost of films and technicians' time. Funds from the seal sales covers cost of extensive x-ray machinery. Since each case of tuberculosis costs the vicinity \$15,000 the machines already have demonstrated their value in cases found in this county. Oregon Faces Cut in Polio Vaccine

Portland — (U.P.) — The public health service will drastically curtail Salk polio vaccine allotments for Oregon unless inoculations are stepped up, it was reported today.

Mark Howard, state board of health spokesman, said he had been informed by public health officials in San Francisco that Oregon's quota of vaccine probably would be reduced because so much of it was expiring unused in pharmacies. The vaccine is ineffective after its expiration date.

Howard also said that this was the third worst year in the polio history of the state with 416 cases reported through Dec. 3. There have been no cases among those who have received Salk shots.

In 1950, 520 cases were reported in 1952 and 415 in 1943. The public health service has already asked Oregon to release 49,000 cubic centimeters of Salk vaccine for use in other areas, Howard said.
