

Resistance Core To Adoption of Asiatics Told by Creswell Man

Creswell, Ore.—(U.P.)—Harry Holt, the Oregon farmer who opened his heart and home to eight mixed-blood Korean war orphans, said today there was a core of resistance to non-Caucasian adoptions by Americans, particularly on the part of some private social agencies on the West Coast.

Holt said the resistance, which he said was based on racial prejudice, was verbal on the part of agency personnel and never was mentioned in published adoption plans.

Referring to opposition to adoption of Asiatics, Holt said he preferred not "to stick my neck out" but he referred to one private agency which he said was active in the foreign adoption field and which appears to be placing roadblocks in the

way of Americans who tried to adopt but European orphans. He declined to identify the agency by name.

Other agencies, he said, had placed an age limit of 35 on parents seeking adoptive children overseas. Holt and his wife are in their early 50s and he said he personally knew of hundreds of other couples in that age group willing and anxious to provide homes for alien orphans. Older couples, he said, were often better equipped emotionally and financially to aid the tiny war victims.

Holt pointed out that orphans in Korea were dying daily while many Americans stood ready to help if channels were open to them.

United States federal agencies, Holt reported, were cooperating fully with Americans trying to adopt Koreans. He said that in his own case, unprecedented in the history of American philanthropy, the United States immigration service had cooperated 100 per cent in expediting admissions of his eight young wards to this country.
