Sherry Fong Found Guilty; Sentencing Scheduled Monday

Portland—(U.P.)—Sherry Fong was found guilty Friday night of second degree murder in the 1954 slaying of her sometime babysitter, Diane Hank.

The Multnomah County Circuit Court jury verdict was announced at 10:20 p.m., some 20 minutes after the jury filed back into the courtroom, and about eight hours after the six men and six women on the panel retired for deliberations.

Jury Foreman Wilbur Wilcox read the verdict. He said the jurors voted 10-2 in favor of the second degree murder verdict. The two jurors in the minority favored acquittal, he said.

Sentencing Monday

Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson said he would set a date for sentencing on Monday.

Sherry Fong, 24-year-old wife of Wey Him Fong who also faces murder charges in the case, was accused of poisoning the 16-year-old Hank girl with a combination of barbiturates and martinis.

The prosecution, handled by District Attorney William Langley and chief prosecutor Howard Lomergan, contended that the Hank girl's knowledge of the Fongs' narcotics activities was the motive for the slaying.

The trial was the third for the young Portland woman. She was found guilty of first degree murder earlier this year, but Judge Dobson overruled the verdict on technical grounds. He cleared a mistrial in the state's second attempt to convict Mrs. Fong, early in November.

Diane Hank was reported missing Jan. 7, 1954, after spending the night with the Fongs. Her body, found in blankets, was traced alongside the Evergreen highway in southwest Washington several weeks later.

Log Pond Breaks; Floods Highway 101
