Safety is not only your concern, and the concern of the police and fire departments. Your Medford Public Library also has something to say. It reminds you, for instance, that safety begins at home. "Home, to almost every one, is sanctuary, the one place where we are protected and safe from mishap and tragedy. But is home really a safe place? Actually the total number of fatal accidents which occur in the home is about one-third the number of all fatal accidents. The encouraging note is that most of these accidents could be avoided."

The ways in which they could be avoided, constructive suggestions about prevention of fires, falls, burns, shocks, are carefully presented in "America's Housekeeping Book," together with the first-aid materi-

als and nursing procedures.

Safety On Job
Safety on the job is hardly less important today. The life and limb of any employee is not now held cheaply, considering the cost of accidents in lost time, replacement of workers, compensation payments, and impaired morale. Since machine safeguards never yet have been sufficient in themselves to prevent accidents, suggestions for developing safety habits in the worker are discussed in Cooper's "How to Supervise People."

Even recreation has its hazards. For the sportsman Paul Gartner has written "First Aid Afield," to tell what to do in case of accident in backwoods or mountains, how to improvise splints, bandages, slings, and stretchers from outdoor equipment. He also indicates common sense methods of self-preservation in boating and swimming accidents in his safety code for lovers of the outdoors.

Auto Safety

In this age of wheels we have the problem of moving traffic efficiently and expeditiously, and the still more serious problem of moving it safely. The secretary of state's safety division has published "Man and the Motor Car" in response to a demand from high schools for a text book before use in driving classes; it is also good reading for anyone who wants to know about the automobile and how to use it safely. A similar publication by the California Motor Vehicles Department is also available at your library. This takes up the problems of cyclist and pedestrian as well as of the motorist.

Human limitations in automobile driving can be stated with considerable accuracy, says Hamilton and Thurstone, authors of "Safe Driving." Their analysis of accidents shows up a definite pattern, understanding of which can help prevent them.

Breezy slogans and humorous jingles make the maxims of good driving easily memorable in Marcus Dow's "Stay Alive!" Expert driving is safe driving! And to be safe you must be an expert. That is the theme of Margaret Hyde's "Driving Today and Tomorrow," written expressly for teen-aged drivers.

For safety's sake, ask for these books at your Medford Public Library.

Tax Commission Files Answer in Court Suit

Salem — (U.P.)—The State Tax commission denied Friday that it was on a so-called "fishing expedition" when it issued subpoenas to lumbering firms for their records of log supplies.

The denial was part of the commission's answer filed in Marion County Circuit court to a suit brought against it by Pope and Talbot, Inc., one of Oregon's largest lumber firms.

Pope and Talbot had asked for a judgment declaring that the commission had no legal right to subpoena the firm's records to gain access to names of log suppliers who might be evading payment of taxes under the forest harvest act.

The firm also challenged the legality of the law which the commission said gave it the right to file actions against firms if they did not comply. In its answer, the commission denied that the "subpenas were directed against a class of taxpayers who may or may not appear on the books." It asked the court to affirm that the commission had acted within the power of the law and that failure of the lumber company to comply with subpoenas made it liable to action at law.

A Nichol's Worth of... Comment On This and That

Washington — (U.P.)—I don't know much about stitching a hem. All I know is that some valet shops charge 35 cents for sewing on a coat button which was nice and tight when it went to the cleaners.

But Margaret L. Brew, head of the household management section of the Department of Agriculture, is an expert. The pretty brunette made a little speech here recently.

She didn't dwell long on the simple performance of button-

sewing-on. Miss Brew reasoned that a woman with any sense knows how to string a needle and how to dab at the holes in a button.

So she went on to things dear to her heart, telling her audience how ladies can save a little of Papa's bring home pay by making their own house dresses.

Thorough Study
Miss Brew was well copped with facts from a preliminary survey her department is conducting. Her helpers, she said, went into all aspects like how long it takes to put some frills on a dress and how long it takes to do everything else. Also the price.

All of the experiments were made in a Department of Agriculture laboratory by experienced seamstresses. Miss Brew conceded it might take the average home-maker a little longer, what with changing diapers, keeping the fire up, and all.

In the preliminary study, duplications were made of house frocks in the \$3 to \$4 range; store bought, that is.

Time in the lab to make these dresses ranged from 1.3 hours to 1.6 hours for size 14, and a little longer than that for size 20.

"The homemaker, making her own dresses, can realize a substantial savings," Miss Brew said.

The Saving
She can, the lady said, save anywhere from 64 cents to \$1.53 for a size 14, and slightly less for size 20.

"Not only that," the agriculture expert said, "women could reduce their money costs by using the same pattern more than once, or by using basic patterns and adapting to different styles."

The way Miss Brew and her age folks look at it, a woman could spend \$17.23 for five house dresses in the store. The cost in housewife stitches would be \$11.62 for a size 14 and \$11.82 for a 20.

Of course, a smart lady could take yesterday's newspaper, flatten it on the floor and make her own patterns. That would save another \$1.75 right there.

The Department of Agriculture charges nothing for this sort of service. And you all are welcome.

Firm Files Request To Re-Open Star

Portland — (U.P.)—Applications to revive Portland's struggling burlesque industry were on file with the city council Saturday.

Though Portland recently boasted two of the 12 burlesque houses in the nation, both the Star and the Capitol theaters are now closed.

John Becker, former operator of the Capitol theater and husband of Burlesque Queen Tempest Storm, applied to the city for a permit to reopen the Capitol to offer "vaudeville entertainment which will consist in part of burlesque shows of a high type."

The Aaron corporation applied for a 1956 license to reopen the Star but just with movies. The Star lost its 1955 license after the city council had complaints that lewd and obscene shows were presented.

A new Portland ordinance now requires police permission for stage shows.

Woman Prefers Jail To Suspended Sentence

High Point, N. C. — (U.P.)—A woman convicted on a worthless check charge politely declined Friday a 30-day suspended sentence given her by Judge J. A. Myatt.

Mary J. Kinney said rather than go free she would like to be sent to the woman's division of central prison where she received such "wonderful treatment" a short time ago.

The judge shrugged his shoulders and granted her request.
