

OVEN BAKED CROQUETTES SAVE TIME



Croquettes made from turkey or other leftovers, can be most appetizing if well seasoned and served with a tasty cream sauce. Many homemakers shy away from making croquettes because of last minute handling, and deep fat frying. Oven Baked Turkey Croquettes will save you time and effort and eliminate deep fat frying. The oven method permits you to have more time for last minute meal preparation. These croquettes are delicious too, as they are given an outside coating of melted butter before being put into the oven. This gives them a delightful, golden, crisp butter flavored crust. Serve them with Celery-Pimiento Cream Sauce. It is the wise homemaker who cooks milk into her meals, as well as serves it as a beverage.

OVEN BAKED TURKEY CROQUETTES WITH CELERY-PIMIENTO SAUCE
THICK CREAM SAUCE
4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4-teaspoon paprika
1 cup milk
Melt butter, add flour and seasonings and blend. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Cook

stirring until mixture is very thick. Cool. Can be stored for several days in the refrigerator.

CROQUETTES

2 cups chopped cooked turkey
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 cup thick cream sauce
1 cup fine bread crumbs
1 egg, beaten with 1 tablespoon water
1/4 cup butter

Mix ingredients in order given except crumbs and egg. Shape into 6-8 croquettes. Chill. Heat oven to 375°F. Put shallow baking pan with butter into oven to heat. When butter is hot, dip croquettes into crumbs, egg, then crumbs, then place in pan, rolling to coat all sides with butter. Bake for about 30 minutes or until brown and crisp. Makes 6-8 servings. Serve with Celery-Pimiento Cream Sauce. To 2 cups medium cream sauce add 1/4 cup chopped pimiento and 1/2 cup cooked celery. Add 2 teaspoons finely minced parsley. Serve over Croquettes. A green vegetable and cranberry salad will go well for contrast.
