December 17 the auxiliary will hold a food sale at the Shady Cove cleaners. Articles of handwork will also be offered for sale.

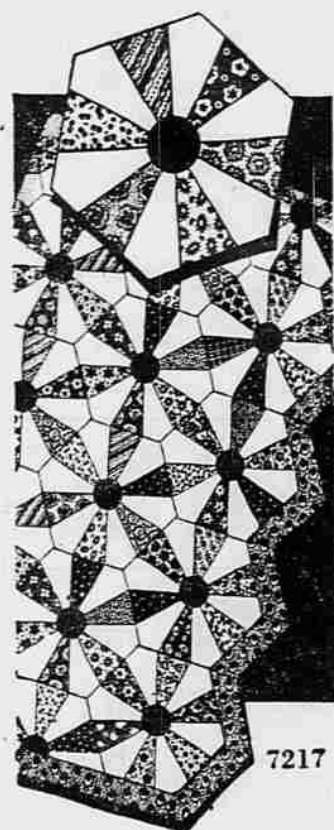
At the last meeting the auxiliary also made plans to give food baskets for Christmas. Refreshments followed the meeting.

Rose Valley—A fine quality Cheddar cheese manufactured by the Mt. Angel Co-operative creamery at Mt. Angel, Ore. Available in mild through sharp flavor and packaged in gift packs, wedges, loaves or wheels. Available in grocery stores.

Raven—Makers of the only Swiss cheese on the Pacific coast, the Raven Creamery's plant in Enterprise, Ore., is well worth a visit if you should be up that way. Raven Swiss is a little harder to get, but well worth the effort, for it rates among the finest in Swiss type cheeses. Raven also makes a good Cheddar cheese available in gift packs, through the Raven Creamery, Portland, or Raven Foods Enterprise.

Crater Lake—A fine Cheddar cheese manufactured by the Klamath Falls creamery, and marketed mainly in Southern Oregon and California. The Klamath Falls creamery also makes a creamy, mild Jack cheese and the flavorful Danish kumminost with caraway seeds. Look for these Crater Lake cheeses in the Klamath Falls area.

Darigold—Another well known brand in Oregon which includes both fine quality Cheddar cheese and Blue Cheese. Darigold makes up a special Christmas package available through the Consolidated Dairy Products company in Portland. Darigold cheeses are available in grocery stores throughout the state.

MelloWest—Another rich-flavored mellow Cheddar cheese manufactured by the Coos Bay Mutual creamery in Coos Bay. Available in grocery stores.

Langlois—Oregon's famous Blue cheese which has achieved nation wide acclaim as being as good, if not better, than the original French Roquefort. Comes in an attractive gift package, in wedges and wheels. Generally available in grocery stores.

Three Sisters—A Cheddar cheese manufactured in Redmond, Ore., by the Central Oregon Dairy Products company. Available in mild through sharp flavors, and marketed mainly in Central Oregon.

Rogue Gold—Another fine Cheddar cheese manufactured by the Grants Pass creamery. Mild to sharp flavor. Marketed mainly in Southern Oregon.

Chatham—A nippy-flavored Cheddar and a creamy mild

Jack cheese are both produced under the Chatham label by the Superior Cheese company in Myrtle Point. Available through Safeway stores in Oregon.

There is a variety of other fine cheese manufactured in Oregon and sold under nationally-known labels such as Kraft and Borden. Although these are not exclusively Oregon brands, they are well-known for their standard of quality, and their holiday packs make welcome gifts.

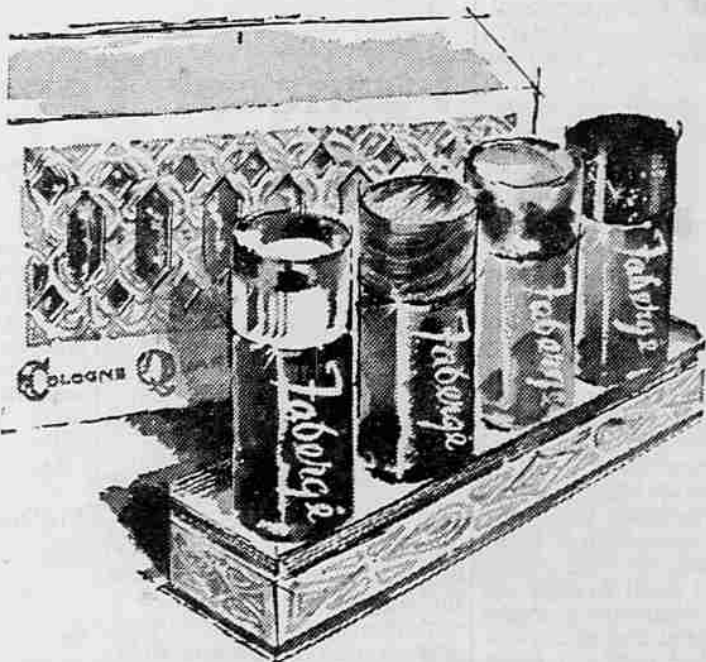

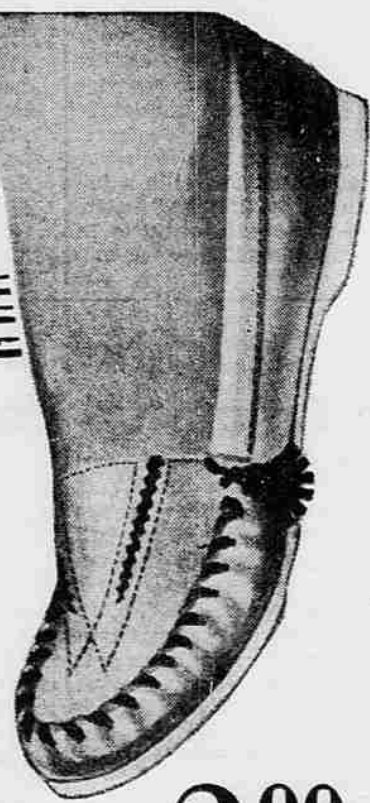
