George Anticipates Altered Conditions Despite Tough Talk

Washington — (U.P.) — Sen. Walter F. George said today he thinks the international situation will improve despite Russia's new tough talk.

"I am not without hope that conditions will improve in the international field," the Georgia Democrat said. He expressed his view as he and other congressional leaders of both parties gathered at the White House for a briefing by President Eisenhower on foreign policy and national defense matters.

It was George, top foreign policy spokesman for the Democrats, who urged that Mr. Eisenhower agree to last summer's Big Four "summit" meeting at Geneva as a step toward solving world problems.

George said he clings to his hope for improved world relations despite increased tensions brought on by the new Communist maneuvers in Berlin and the Middle East.

He said there is "bound to be a change" in those areas—"They cannot remain in the situation they are now in." He said he was "not without hope" that the change would be "for the better."

Mr. Eisenhower called today's conference to seek bipartisan support for the administration's strategy against the new Russian stand. That strategy consists of a strengthened North Atlantic Treaty Organization, maintaining the free world's military might and broadening the "win-friends-abroad" foreign aid program.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who attended today's White House conference, planned to leave after the meeting to work on one phase of the strategy. In France he will confer with NATO foreign ministers on improving European defenses.

Mr. Eisenhower arranged today's meeting as his foreign policy was coming under increasing heavy attack by candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination — Adlai Stevenson, New York Gov. Averell Harriman and Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) Both Dulles and George have urged previously that foreign policy be made a subject of constructive criticism and not of "partisan excesses."

After today's meeting the President planned to return to his Gettysburg, Pa., farm in the afternoon and begin adhering to his doctors' orders to take it easier.

The President put in one of his busiest days Monday. He spent six hours and 55 minutes in a conference with Republican congressional leaders on his legislative program for next year.

The President laid before his congressional leaders a program calling for a balanced budget and a farm program aimed at quieting complaints about the administration's handling of falling farm prices.

Former Convict Slays Children, Estranged Wife

Dallas, Tex.—(U.P.)—A berserk ex-convict today killed his three children, cutting their throats and shooting them, and murdered his estranged wife and gravely wounded her son-in-law.

Police Sgt. George Johns cornered the killer, Buford Calhoun, 32, in a drugstore telephone booth and shot it out with him.

Johns wounded Calhoun three or four times with his .38 caliber revolver, including one wound in the head, as Calhoun fired a .22 caliber pistol through the glass of the telephone booth but missed Johns.

Calhoun was still alive.

Twins Among Dead
The babies were three-month-old twins Pamela Sue and Patricia Lou, asleep in the same crib. The older baby, Bobby Lynn, was asleep with his mother, Mrs. Mary Calhoun, 33.

The wounded man was John Warren, 19. His wife, Shirley, 16, said she and her husband were asleep in the front bedroom of the five-room frame house in East Dallas and were awakened when they heard Mrs. Calhoun moving around. Shirley said she finally got up to see what was going on.

"When I went in both of them were coming out of the kitchen into her room," she said. "He had a pistol. Mother was screaming 'Shirley, help me.'"

Shirley was still so hysterical police could not get a complete story.

Famed Glacier Priest In Serious Condition

Newark, N.Y. — (U.P.) — The Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, 67, famed Glacier Priest of Alaska, was in serious condition in Doctors Hospital here today from a cerebral hemorrhage.

Father Hubbard, known the world over for his Alaskan explorations, suffered the hemorrhage here Saturday while preparing to say mass in the Chapel of the Nuns Convent at St. Michael's Parochial school.

The priest stopped off here on his way to Hartford, Conn., to visit friends.

Father Hubbard was putting on his mass vestments in the chapel when stricken. He was taken immediately to the hospital. His physician, Dr. James Palmeri, described his condition as "serious but not critical."

Since 1926, Father Hubbard has been dean of geology at Santa Clara University, Calif., where he makes his home.

Fish Derby Sponsors Reminded of New Law

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon communities planning 1956 fish derbies were reminded today that they can no longer offer valuable cash prizes for fish caught.

A new state law goes into effect Jan. 1 which limits individual fish derby awards to "awards of merit" such as ribbons or trophies that are not valued at more than \$25.

There was an attempt at the 1955 Legislature to outlaw fish derbies outright as a threat to game fish supplies.

Another angling law which becomes effective the first of the year is the imposition of the Oregon salmon bag limit on catches taken beyond the three-mile limit off the Oregon coast. Exempt are salmon taken in waters off another state or territory or in foreign waters.

There will be no change in the regulation which permits salmon fishing without a license beyond the three-mile limit.
