Watson Stresses All-Out Effort in Gridiron Talk

Stressing the importance of "giving the all-out effort" and stating that his school is not looking for "athletic bums," but for "student athletes," Bob Watson, backfield coach at Oregon State college, addressed a Medford Lions club dinner honoring Medford high football squad seniors, yell staff members and coaches last night at the hotel.

Watson, a former Medford high star, voiced his pride in having been a Black Tornado athlete, praised the grade school athletic program here and gave advice to the students concerning entering college.

The mentor emphasized that the only real pleasure from football is winning.

The mentor emphasized that the amount of effort put out will determine the value received from academic courses or from football.

Watson said he didn't think there is room for "dumb" football players any more. He mentioned details that must be learned by players on various plays—what to do in a given situation—and he said that a lot is expected of a player.

A scholarship is not an important requisite in going to college, Watson brought out. College is available to those who have a real desire to go and seek it, he advised.

Watson remarked that he considered it an honor and a privilege to play on Black Tornado teams. He pointed to the ominous note in the Tornado nickname and its meaning of power in the minds of other schools.

Speaking of the type of boy who thinks he cannot go to college because he's concentrated on fun in high school and is deficient academically, Watson told the senior gridlers to get to their books, build up their grade averages as high as possible and develop good study habits.

Watson found no favor with parents or friends exercising undue influence in determining where a boy is to go to school. He said that it is a mistake to follow a buddy to school just for that reason and said the college attended "should be the school of your choice."

On the matter of winning games, Watson agreed with his coach at University of California at Los Angeles, Red Sanders, the UCLA tutor as saying, "winning isn't everything, it's the only thing."

Concerning grade school athletics, Watson said that he is a real firm believer in such a program. Boys may not learn a lot, he allowed, but yet will be instilled with desire.
