Portland — (U.P.)—Federal grand jury indictments Friday were returned against three men in connection with two separate bank robberies.

Henry Clay Wyatt, 30, was charged with the Nov. 23 hold-up of the main office of the First National Bank of Portland. Wyatt, armed with a cap pistol, allegedly obtained \$1,019 in the holdup.

Recommend Higher Fines For Drinking Drivers

Mr. Carter, a native of Portland, Ore., was born on Oct. 15, 1874, and was a journeyman lithographer, following the trade of his father, William D. Carter, a pioneer Oregon newspaperman and first shop foreman of the Portland Oregonian.

War Veteran
He served with Company E of the Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry Regiment in the Philippine islands during the Spanish American war and the Philippine insurrection. He was a long-time member of Colonel Sargent camp of the United Spanish War Veterans.

His early years were spent in Portland, but he had been a resident of southern Oregon for 30 years. He owned and operated an employment agency in Klamath Falls until 1935 when he moved to a farm at Eagle Point where he lived until moving to Medford in 1947.

Second Artic Blast Pushes Into Deep South, Midwest

The second Arctic blast this week pushed cold weather deep into the Southland Saturday and dropped temperatures into the 20s in northern Florida.

Moderate to heavy snows fell over the Rockies in Montana with up to 9 inches recorded in a 24-hour period at Missoula. Light snow also fell in Idaho and flurries were general over the Pacific Northwest, except along the coast, and over the middle Mississippi Valley to the northern Great Lakes.

Rain or drizzle dampened the Pacific Northwest coastal area. Mostly fair skies prevailed elsewhere. In the central plains and Great Lakes areas southerly winds took the edge off the bitter cold of the past several days.

The mercury shot up to the 60s on the east slopes of the central Rockies as a "chinook" wind dispelled the cold. But the wind whipped Denver, Colo., with gusts up to 58 miles an hour.

High temperatures Friday at La Junta and La Mar, Colo., were 61 degrees. Carlsbad, N. M., reported 69 and it was 41 at Cheyenne.

But in Florida, Cross City reported a morning low of 24 degrees as the Arctic weather invaded the deep South.

It was pushed by colder weather to the north that sent the mercury to 4 below zero at Dickinson, N. D., and 5 below at Minot, N.D., drops of 18 to 14 degrees from Friday.

Casper, Wyo., cooled 21 degrees with the morning temperature at 13.

Man Survives After 13 Hours in Ocean

Grimsby, England — (U.P.)—A seaman washed overboard in a North Sea storm and given up for lost crawled ashore Saturday the exhausted victor of a 13-hour battle against the raging sea although he couldn't swim.

Harold Cook, 35, was swept overboard from the trawler Denton two miles off this Lincolnshire port before dawn Friday. The trawler spent three hours searching for him before returning to port. The crew knew Denton could not swim and reported him lost.

Thirteen hours later, nearly drowned and with his mouth full of sand, Cook struggled ashore on the beach at nearby Cleethorpes. A local resident out duck shooting saw him stretched out at the water's edge and dragged him in.

Soviet Army Controls Remote Asian Nation

Tokyo — (U.P.)—Japanese freed from Outer Mongolia said Saturday the Soviet Army is controlling that remote Asian nation despite "bad" feelings of the Mongolian people.

Russia is building Mongolia into a modern state and developing its oil resources, the Japanese reported.

They charged that Mongolians are "forced to buy inferior Russian goods and thus relations are bad between the Mongolians and Russia." Four of them were imprisoned in Mongolia as war criminals.

Japanese To Halt Cotton Goods Export

Tokyo — (U.P.)—The Japanese government Saturday announced it would halt exports of cotton goods to Canada effective next Monday.

The announcement by the Ministry of International Trade and Industry said contracts for cotton goods exports to Canada would not be accepted from that date.

The Japanese government took a similar action on cotton goods exports to the United States Nov. 22. At that time the Ministry of International Trade and

Industry said the export ban will remain in effect until some kind of control system is adopted to limit cotton exports to the United States.

The ban was enforced to head measures. It stemmed from American textile industry demands that the U.S. congress take action to halt the flood of cheap Japanese cotton goods in American markets, notably the controversial "dollar blouses."
