 Want to vary the flavor of the new salad dressing mixes that come in envelopes? In place of the amount of water called for, try using white wine, red wine, vermouth, chili sauce, catsup, tomato juice, sour cream, fruit juices, mayonnaise, canned tomato soup, or V-8 juice. Or use two tablespoons of any of these, in addition to the water. In short, experiment! Add vinegar and oil as directed. 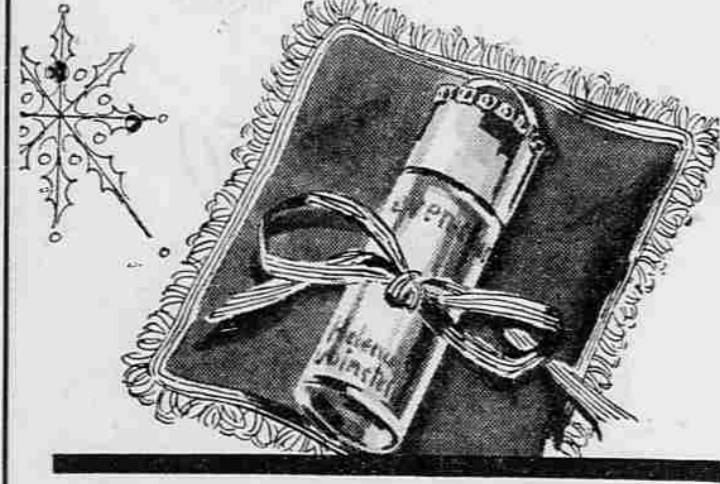
