

Black Tornado Hoop Quintet Storms 80-44 Over Pirates

The Medford high basketball team traveled to Roseburg Tuesday night for the first of two games this week with the Indians. Return fracas will be here on Friday in the opening action on the court at new Hedrick junior high school.

Roseburg has started this season with only two lettermen from last year, Jerry Droscher, 6-foot center, and Bill Oerding, a 5-10 guard. But the Indians have a top transfer in Dick Woolstenhulme, 6-3, who starred for last year's strong North Bend aggregation.

Action for the Indians so far this season has included a split with Grants Pass and wins over Sutherlin and Myrtle Creek.

Medford high's newest basketball version of the Black Tornado is bound and determined not to dwell in the glowing shadow of its 1954-1955 powerhouse predecessor. That ambition and firmness of purpose stuck out all over Saturday night as the Tornado stormed and rushed to a surprising 80 to 44 triumph over the Gold Pirates of Marshfield of Coos Bay.

Up against a rugged, more experienced Pirate crew, the Black Tornado responded to the reputedly tough cut out for it by a hard-driving, alert, ballhawking effort, outshooting the Oregon coast quintet and outplaying it almost all the way.

High-spirited from the start, the conflict turned into a rough and tumble football performance in the final stages. And 62 fouls were whistled in the furious game. Medford utilized the free shots it got, its better ball handling, its ability to match the tall Pirates on the backboards and a hawking defense to take command in the early moments. And the Tornado, continuing with those factors, never lost its upper hand.

Bob Tisdell, Dick McLaughlin and Dick Cople paced the scoring. McLaughlin, Neil Plumley and Cople the rebounding and Tisdell, John Foust and Lloyd Clearley the ballhawking as the Tornado chalked up its third victory in four games so far this season.

Medford took over the lead for good when McLaughlin potted a rebound shot when the conflict was a minute old. That made the score 4 to 2. From there the Tornado worked to an 18 to 3 margin but the Pirates fought back to cut the count to 20 to 11 at the quarter intermission.

That lead of nine points represented the closest Marshfield could get to Medford. After 22 to 13 and 23 to 14 standings in the second panel, the Tornado expanded to a 26-point spread of 44 to 18, but the Coos Baymen managed to slim their deficit down to 20 points at 44 to 24 by halftime.

In the third quarter Medford rolled up 23 counters while Marshfield was getting but five, all on free shots, for a 56 point gap of 87 to 29.

Medford's margin was its widest, 40 points, shortly after the fourth canto opened with a score of 69 to 29.

The Tornado poured in 24 field goals during the night and, with a tough defense that constantly stole or wrested the ball away, held the Pirates to only 12 field buckets for the game. Marshfield managed none in the third quarter.

At the free throw line Medford got 34 opportunities and made good on 32. The Pirates shot 10 for 39.

In the rebound grabbing department, where the Pirates were expected to excel because of greater all-around height and experience, Medford had the edge 44 to 39. The clubs were even at 21 apiece for the first half.

In individual work McLaughlin had 11 retrieves, Plumley nine and Cople six. For Marshfield Hardy Spurgen led with 10 and Sandy Fraser had seven.

In scoring Tisdell and McLaughlin took high honors with 17 each and Cople matched Tisdell's six field goals and had four free shots for 16 total. Fraser headed the Pirates with 12.

Regrees Lee Flink and Virgil Swanson tooted 35 fouls on Marshfield and 27 on Medford. The Pirates lost Fraser and Barry Buller on infractions in third quarter and Rod Lewis in the fourth. Tisdell, after a driving, all-over-the-court game, and Plumley were banished late in the third stanza and each of the two got a roaring ovation from the Medford cheer section as they left the floor.

The Tornado hit a good share of its shots from close in or mid range but also fired effectively from far out.

Dons Take DePaul Laurels; Aim for Win String Mark

San Francisco's national champion Dons added another big tournament title to their collection today as they set out on their quest for the nine more victories that will give them an all-time record for consecutive triumphs.

The target now is 40 straight wins—topping the major college mark of 39 set by Long Island university in 1935-36 and tied by Seton Hall in 1940-41.

The Dons' 82-59 conquest of DePaul Saturday, stunning in the ease with which they accomplished it, gave San Francisco the championship in the important De Paul tournament at Chicago and set their winning streak at 31 games, extending back to the beginning of last season and including five this season.

The champs now turn south on their big national tour, visiting Wichita Tuesday night and Loyola at New Orleans Friday before going to New York next week for three games in a holiday festival tournament. A sweep of these five games would send the Dons home with 36 victories, and would enable them to tie the record by beating weaker rivals Pepperdine, Santa Clara, and on Jan. 13, Fresno State, and break it by beating California on Jan. 28.

On their awesome performance in Chicago, the Dons now are solid favorites to sweep through to a new record. In Friday's opening round, they whipped previously unbeaten Marquette, 65-68. In Saturday's finale, they simply ran away from a DePaul team that beat Duquesne and nearly beat Kentucky, piling up a 25-point lead in the first 15 minutes. The Los Angeles Rams, who play host to Cleveland in the league's championship game on Dec. 26, won two berths in voting by 30 sports writers who covered the NFL campaign.

The Chicago Bears, Baltimore Colts and San Francisco Forty-Niners also placed two players apiece on the first time. Each of the other seven teams placed one man on the mythical two-platoon team.

Cleveland, which won the Eastern division title for the sixth straight year, placed quarterback Otto Graham, tackle Lou Groza, guard Abe Gibron, and center Frank Gatski on the offensive first team. End Len Ford, tackle Don Colo and half-

back Don Paul of the Browns won places on the defensive first team. Graham, Groza and Ford each made the team for the fifth straight season.

Los Angeles the Western division champion, placed Ron Walker, rookie halfback from Maryland, on the offensive unit and halfback Bill Sherman on the defensive platoon.

The others who won positions on the offensive team were ends Harlon Hill of the Bears and Billy Wilson of San Francisco; tackle Bob St. Clair of San Francisco; guard Bill Austin of New York; halfback Ollie Matson of the Chicago Cardinals and fullback Alan Ameche of Baltimore.

The remainder of the defensive platoon was made up of end Gene Brito of Washington; tackle Art Donovan of Baltimore; middle guard Dale Dodrill of Pittsburgh; linebackers Chuck Bednarik of Philadelphia and George Connor of the Bears; and halfbacks Jack Christiansen and Bobby Dillon of Green Bay.
