## The Medical Roundup

### PEOPLE WHO DO NOT UNDERSTAND WHAT THEY READ

Most of the few bitter letters I get are from people who evidently cannot read well or who were so upset at what they read that they could not understand it clearly. They were somewhat like a girl who, when she reads a very disturbing letter from her beau, has her eyes so full of tears that she cannot see exactly what he says. As a result, she gets all mixed about it.

To illustrate: A correspondent just accused me angrily of telling the relatives of psychotic persons that they have no right to marry. I am sure I never said that and I never will say it. Skilled human geneticists never tell couples with insane or epileptic relatives that they must not marry; all they say is that if they marry and have children, one in two, or one in four, or one in 50 of these children are likely to be paralyzed or insane or blind or occasionally convulsed. Then it is up to the couple to decide whether they want to run that amount of risk of bringing defective children into the world. Some will go ahead and take the risk, while others won't.

It is hard to understand why another group of persons recently accused me of having said that epileptics commonly go insane. I certainly could not have said that, because it is not true. What I probably said was that one in four of 99 epileptics I have seen in the last few years told me he (or she) had a relative who had been at times depressed. I may have said, also, that I have found that if an epileptic has four children, one of them is likely at times to be somewhat depressed. This is not an accusation or a libel; it is just a summing-up of what my patients told me.

Plans Brief Histories

Another thing that people accuse me of having said is that if one has inherited a tendency to psychosis from some ancestor he must go insane. I never said that and I never will, because it is not true. I probably said that often I marvel that a person who has a history of insanity even in both his father's and his mother's stocks is as good and sane and kindly and sensible as he is. I plan some day to publish dozens of brief histories of persons with such a bad ancestry who either seemed to have got off scot-free, or else inherited just a bunch of nerves, or a violent temper, or a great anxiety about health.

Recently I had a patient in the office—a successful businessman of 55—who has been a good, kindly husband and father in spite of the fact that he had a psychotic mother and an alcoholic father. When he was 20, he had to be taken out of college for a while and treated in a mental hospital because of a spell of depression.

But he soon got over this, and although throughout his life he has had to fight a tendency to great moodiness, he has done wonderfully well, and, I should say, is eminently sane.

Fought Off Tendency

Another fine man of 70 who has been successful in life told me that his mother, a brother, an uncle and a nephew were all, at times, insane. All his life my patient has had spells of two or three days in which he has been depressed and unsocial and difficult to live with, but he has fought off his tendency and, as a result, has held the affection of his wife and of scores of friends.

The point I want to make is that, although many of us have inherited a sensitive nervous system and a tendency to some abnormal thinking, this does not

mean that we cannot stay sane and useful and successful all our days. Most of us with a nervous handicap do stay sane.

I do not enjoy writing of such unpleasant subjects but I feel it is my duty to back up those many fine psychiatrists and many devoted lay men and women who are now trying hard to help the insane and the epileptic and the mentally retarded. For too long, many of us humans have refused to face facts that we did not like. Why can't we see that if we go on doing this, we will never find a cure for the greatest of the scourges of man? If, years ago, Dr. Banting had been forced by the public to say nothing and do nothing about the hereditary disease called diabetes, today we would not have that blessed drug, insulin, which enables diabetics to live out their life in comfort.

Some persons with insane or epileptic relatives demand that I be silenced and not allowed to discuss insanity or epilepsy; or they demand that, as in Russia, I stick to the party line and never mention the great importance of heredity. All I ask of these persons is to remember how many of us had parents or grandparents who escaped from Europe and came to this country to get freedom to say what they thought or knew about many things. My father and one of my great-grandfathers came to this country to get freedom of speech.

## Around Hollywood

Hollywood—(U.P.)—Actor Donald Curtis is a well-known face to movie-goers for portraying wolves and barflies on the screen. But, he revealed today that he does a switch on Sundays by working as a real-life minister.

Curtis can claim to be the only actor in the celluloid city who turns his collar around Sunday and gets up in a pulpit to deliver a Christmas sermon.

For nearly two years he's been commuting from Hollywood to his Church of Religious Science in Santa Barbara, more than 70 miles away.

Connection Described

"There is a connection between the two professions," Curtis said. "You need color and presence to help you dramatize a spiritual message. And I've discovered great resources as an actor by applying the religious principles I teach."

Film fans remember Curtis as the television star who chased Kim Novak in "Phffft." He was the country club lush in a new romantic epic, "All That Heaven Allows."

His church congregation knows he's an actor because, as he says, "It's nothing to keep under cover or be ashamed of." But there have been no complaints from the parish members because of his film roles.

"However, they can't understand why I can't get some roles in which I could express the teachings of the church," the handsome actor said.

Curtis has about 500 persons

in his congregation. While he's working on pictures during the week, he jots down notes for his Sunday sermons.

Recently he switched from a tuxedo to a toga for the type of role he likes to do—as a faithful follower of Moses in "The Ten Commandments." One night he invited his congregation to what he believed was a sneak preview of that religious film. Instead it was "All That Heaven Allows."

"I've always played the other man, the second man," he said. "I would like straight leading roles that would be in more keeping with my Sunday profession."

## Income Tax Fraud Convictions Set Mark

Washington—(U.P.)—The Justice Department reported yesterday it convicted a record number of Americans for criminal income tax fraud in 1955.

Assistant Attorney General H. Brian Holland, retiring head of the Tax Division, said 606 persons were convicted of such criminal fraud. There were 542 such convictions in 1954, 493 in 1953, and 377 in 1952.

Criminal tax fraud cases are prosecuted against persons accused of willfully violating the tax laws.

Holland said that since January, 1953, when the Eisenhower administration took over, 1,641 persons have been convicted of criminal fraud. This exceeded by "more than 100 the total of all convictions for similar tax offenses in the four-year period 1949-1952," he said.
