

Tornado Opposes Franklin Hoopmen; Cavemen Play Cleveland Here Tonight

The major attraction of pre-conference basketball in the Rogue River valley starts off tonight at Hedrick junior high here with the first of two treat doubleheaders matching clubs of the Southern Oregon Conference and the Portland Interscholastic League.

Grants Pass High will go against Cleveland of Portland in the opening game at 7:15 o'clock in Medford's new prep "home" court and the host Medford Black Tornado will mix with the hot running Franklin Quakers in the nightcap. The four quintets will move to Grants Pass on Thursday, trading rivals. Medford tussles Cleveland in the 7:15 p.m. starter and Grants Pass follows against Franklin.

For the Medford aggregation tonight's ruckus will be the last one at home before they open defense of their conference title and tomorrow's engagement will complete a slate of seven pre-loop tune-ups.

Tornado objective tonight will be to halt the win string of the Quakers. Franklin is unbeaten in five times out this season while Medford has a four-win one-loss mark. It's a particularly tough assignment for Medford for they have no one to match the 6 feet 9 inches of Franklin's Bjorne Jensen.

Asked today how Medford will try to stop the elongated Quaker, Coach Frank Roelandt replied, "We'll try different ways." That indicates that the Tornado, with Neil Plumley tallest at 6-4, has its height disadvantage firmly in mind and will try various means to overcome it until an effective method is found.

Roelandt indicated that the Tornado squad is intact except for Larry Gober, who suffered a badly sprained ankle in practice yesterday. He may be out of action for about three weeks. The mentor said his squad has been "looking all right" but he mentioned that a cold gym has hindered practices some.

Starters for Medford will be named from among Dick McLoughlin, John Foust, Dick Cople, Neil Plumley, Lloyd Carley and Bob Tisdell. Jensen will likely team with Ernie Spargur, Jack Luhrs, Jim Kuhn and Hutton.

Quakers Trim Salem Club Franklin counts wins over Central Catholic, South Salem and North Salem and Hillsboro so far with two wins over the latter school.

Cleveland's record isn't so bright as Franklin's this year out. Tribe has Portland's lead.

Win, lose or draw, the 22-year-old Arel, from Massena, N.Y., will pocket at least \$5,000 from the fight, his first television appearance. Arel previously has never earned more than \$400 for any one fight.

But the up-and-coming southpaw is likely to have plenty of trouble when he steps into the ring against the determined Pep at the Miami Beach Auditorium. Pep is favored at 5-1.

New Orleans—(U.P.)—The Sugar Bowl Carnival of Sports starts tonight with defending champion Louisiana State university trying for its sixth boxing title against Syracuse.

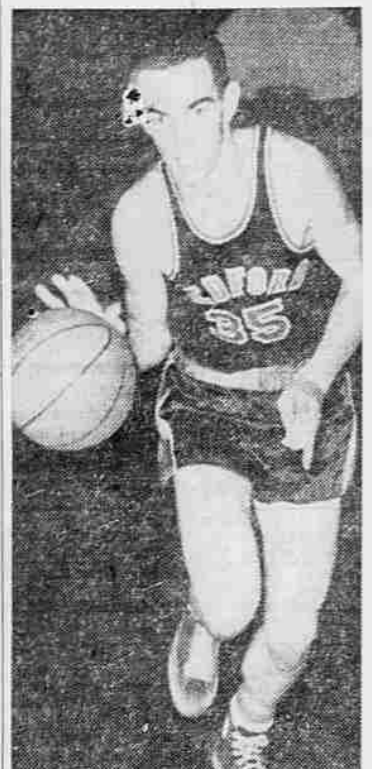

Dons Battle Holy Cross In Garden

College basketball turns into a 12-ring circus of Christmas tournaments tonight with national champion San Francisco shooting for its 35th straight victory and Brigham Young bidding for a championship in the top-billed games.

A victory for San Francisco in the semi-final round of the Holiday Festival tournament in New York would tie the Dons for the fourth longest winning streak in major-college history.

But this clash with Holy Cross, the nation's No. 7 team, figures as the toughest test the champions have faced so far this year. The Dons' Bill Russell, six-foot, 10-inch All-America center, faced a real challenge from six-year Tom Heinsohn of the Crusaders in a personal duel that probably will decide the game.

UCLA meets defending champ Duquesne in the other semi-final. Brigham Young, ranked No. 11 nationally, is favored to win the crown in the Motor City tournament at Detroit, facing host Detroit in the final round.

In the opening games Tuesday night, five-nine Terry Tebbis of Brigham Young set a new tourney record with 36 points in an 89-70 rout of Toledo and Detroit set a new team tourney record by drubbing Penn State, 91-58.

ed Ohio Univ. 103-83; Eastern routed Bowling Green 94-65 and Murray downed Morehead, 106-97.

and losses to North Bend and Marshfield, may have Larry Henderson, Jim Smith, Ron Davis, Chuck Nevi and Tom Burnett in its starting combination. Cleveland was last year's P.I.L. champion and Franklin won a playoff for second place. Medford defeated both schools in the state tourney.

Record for the Tornado so far is a split with Eugene and victories over North Bend, Marshfield and Roseburg.

The Pirates of Phoenix were on top all the way in bouncing the Crusaders from Medford. Eagle Point in a ding dong battle with the Bulldogs broke a 41-all fourth quarter tie and held on to win. Both A-2 schools turned in snapper and better performances over their Class B foes than on Monday when the Pirates nosed out Talent and St. Mary's trimmed the Eagles in conflicts at Eagle Point.

Phoenix pulled away in the second half to gain its wide margin over the Medford club. Quarterly scores favored the Pirates 12 to 8, 31 to 23 and 43 to 27. Widest gap was 22 points in the fourth quarter, 57 to 35. Bill Madden was high scorer for the victors with 16 markers. Laval Meunier put in 14 for the Crusaders.

Eagle Point and Talent were tied nine times in the first half of their encounter. The lead changed hands on the same number of occasions. The Bulldogs had a 14 to 12 edge at the quarter but the Eagles were in front 31 to 29 at the half. There was no lead switch in the second half although Talent was a threat all the way.

The Eagles built up a 38 to 31 margin in the third quarter but Talent quickly closed the gap to 40 to 39 by the end of the stanza. The 41-all knot was in the opening moments of the final quarter. Best margins the Eagles could pick up in the last panel were five points on four occasions but the Bulldogs had the edge cut down to 52 to 50 with 30 seconds left to play. Gary Foran sank a clincher bucket with 15 seconds left.

Jack Greb of Eagle Point led the scoring with 25 points while Bob Hoffman of Talent piled up 23.

Better work on the backboards and a stiffer defense which gave St. Mary's few close in shooting chances in the early part of the game paid off in the Phoenix win. In the meantime the Pirates were able to get off shots from close or fairly close range and they were hitting well.

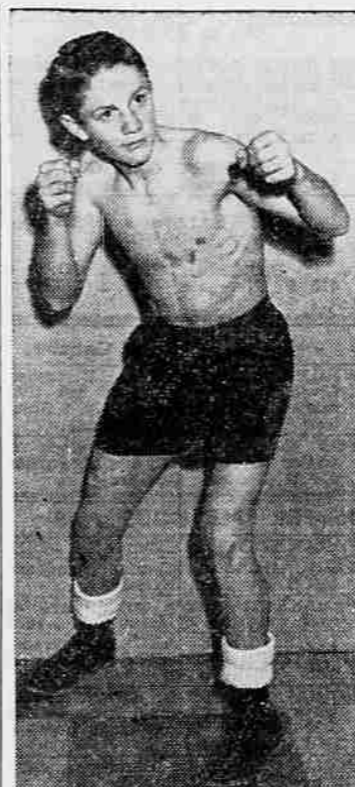

Podres Cited By Magazine

New York—Johnny Podres, who pitched the Brooklyn Dodgers to victory in the spectacular seventh game of the 1955 World Series, was named Sportsman of the Year today by the Editors of Sports Illustrated. In 1954, the magazine's salute to the one person "whose efforts and achievements did most to enhance the prestige of sports during the past year," went to four-minute-miler Roger Bannister.

Announcing Podres as first choice for this year, the Jan. 2 issue of Sports Illustrated says that although there were many others in the 1955 world of sport who were eminent candidates for the honor, "nowhere did a man do what he had to do so well as Johnny Podres did that day. Nowhere else in all the world did sports mean as much to as many people as it did the day John Podres beat the Yankees."

The citation calls John Podres, grandson of a miner from Czarist Russia and the son of an American miner, the living personification of the dreams of small boys who throw a ball against the side of a house and dream of playing in the majors.

Davenport Named Most Valuable

Palo Alto, Calif.—(U.P.)—UCLA fullback Bob Davenport was named the most valuable senior college football player on the Pacific Coast today by 400 coast sports experts.

Davenport beat out Stanford fullback, Bill Tarr, by 10 votes to win the seventh annual Pop Warner Memorial award. Davenport's win was the closest in the history of the award voted yearly by Pacific Coast sports writers, broadcasters and coaches.

The Bruin fullback will be given a wrist watch and trophy at the Palo Alto club's annual banquet on Jan. 31.

Clyde Lovellette Pro Hoop Leader

New York—(U.P.)—Big Clyde Lovellette of the Minneapolis Lakers, playing two games during the week while Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks was idle, took over the National Basketball Assn. scoring and rebound leaderships today.

Official league figures, including games through Sunday, Dec. 25, credit the six-10 Laker with 538 points in 25 games. Pettit, the six-nine former Louisiana State star, drops to second with 500 in 20 games, although he boasts the best per-game mark with 25.0.

Michigan State (8-1-0) over UCLA (9-1)—These are two clubs which feature speed and the Uclans would seem to have a passing edge if Ronnie Knox is fit for full-time duty. But the Spartans have a psychological edge going for them in the long string of Midwest triumphs over the Western teams. They also have a sterling pass defense and a vastly underrated field general in Earl Morrall.

To coin a phrase, the ball takes funny bounces. But the boys from the Big 10 will take a lot of beating.

Orange Bowl
Oklahoma (10-0-0) over Maryland (10-0-0)—This has got to be the game of the day as Monday because both clubs are unbeaten and the winner could be considered the national champion. You can argue schedule here, on the premise that Maryland played the tougher lineup.

It figures, however, as a battle between a great Maryland defense and a fast-striking Oklahoma offense which will be more dangerous in the second half than in the opening quarters. And, in football, you have to go with the guys who can score.

Sugar Bowl
Georgia Tech (9-1-1) over Pitt (7-3-0)—Had this been played a week ago, when Pitt was stirred up over the segregation issue, the onrushing Panthers would have been a cozy bet. But Tech is recovering from its humiliation and, knowing that it will have to be "up," should reach an even higher peak than Pitt by kickoff time.

Realize, too, that Tech doesn't beat itself. This is a club which has fumbled away the ball only four times all year, an amazing figure in a season marked by fumbleitis.

TCU (9-1-0) over Mississippi

(9-1-0)—The posse is a clinch to ride, but you have to grant the "home" team an edge in this one. Nobody will throw those Christians to the officiating lions in Dallas.

Gator Bowl
Auburn (9-1-1) over Vanderbilt (7-3-0)—Here's another "home" team choice, the Auburn club appearing in the Gator Bowl for the third year in a row. They've got the horses, and what else do you need?

Sun Bowl
Texas Tech (7-2-1) over Wyoming (8-3-0)—Tech, which can and does hold its own with the best in the Southwest Conference, figures to be a league above the Cowboys. This holds particularly because Wyoming has injury problems.

USGA Issues Two Revised Rule Books
New York—(U.P.)—The United States Golf association today announced the release of two revised manuals — the playing rules of the game, and the rules of amateur status.

Major changes in both, approved by the USGA and the Royal and Ancient club of St. Andrews, Scotland, in an effort to standardize the game in Britain and the United States, had been announced last September.

The playing rules contain two major changes and several minor ones. The major changes are:

1. In match and stroke play, the player playing the stroke will have sole control of the flagstick rather than opponent having any control. If player's ball strikes unattended flagstick, there is no penalty this was previously penalized. If player's ball strikes attended flagstick, the player is penalized.

2. In match play, on the putting green, the player who is away and shooting may ask to have a ball nearer the hole lifted if he believes it will interfere with his play. The ball's owner has no control. In stroke play, the player who is away and shooting may ask the ball's owner to lift it or shoot first, the choice being left to the owner. In stroke play only, if the ball's owner thinks his ball may interfere with player who is first and shooting, he may play first—but he may not lift it, unless the away player gives him the choice by asking.
