Neuberger Says Flood Aid Often 'Illusory'

Portland—(U.P.)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) today declared that present aid offered by the federal government to flood victims is "often largely illusory."
Neuberger said that when Congress convenes next week he intends to join with senators from the New England states in sponsoring a program for federal flood insurance.

The senator said "the tragic burden of rebuilding after floods should be borne by the whole nation, and not one or two isolated and unfortunate communities."

He added that loans "are of scant help" to families who have lost the home they have been paying for over a period of 20 years.

"What that family needs is a grant for buying another house or farm," he said.

Housing Unit Planned At Klamath Air Base

Klamath Falls—(U.P.)—Plans for a 220-unit FHA-military housing unit at Klamath Falls Air Force Base were announced here yesterday.

Air Force officials and the local Chamber of Commerce said the joint project would provide only half the military housing needs at the base.

Contract awards probably will be announced about July 15.

Carpenters Assured Of Hourly Wage Hike

Portland—(U.P.)—An agreement giving carpenters a five-cent hourly wage increase Jan. 1, 1937 and 10-cent increase in 1937 and 1938 was approved last night by the Portland District Council of Carpenters after the Oregon state council had accepted the plan earlier in the day.
