Bitter Cold Starts New Year's Week-End

By UNITED PRESS Biting winter weather ushered in the start of the New Year's holiday in most of the nation's north today.

A new cold wave clamped icy temperatures on the northern plains, the upper Mississippi valley, and most of the Great Lakes. Low temperatures included 15 below at Grantsburg, Wis., 1 above at Bismarck, N.D., and 14 at Chicago.

The cold blast also penetrated the southern plains and Ohio valley, but with less bitterness. Farther east, freezing rain or drizzle slicked roads in parts of Pennsylvania and New York. Temperatures were also below normal in the west, where Californians rolled up their sleeves in wintry weather for their biggest reconstruction job since the San Francisco earthquake.

Danger of Schrunck Job Loss Said Over

Salem—(U.P.)—The immediate danger of Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schrunck losing his job over a legal technicality was over today.

Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton told Gov. Paul Patterson yesterday that he need not declare the office vacant until courts have passed on constitutionality of the law which requires such action.

Earlier, Thornton had said the law requires the governor to take such action because of a judgment obtained against the sheriff's bond in a case involving the serving of legal papers. Patterson said he would not act on the matter until it is ruled on by the courts.

Schrunck said he was "very happy" that the matter has come to a head because it involved an important legal point. He said he believed the governor had acted wisely.

Anchorage Paralyzed By Record Snowfall

Anchorage, Alaska—(U.P.)—Anchorage residents battled belt-high snow today as the city lay paralyzed under the heaviest early winter snowstorm in history.

Mayor Ken Hinchey declared a state of semi-emergency and asked that non-essential snow removal crews venture into the downtown area.

Businesses declared a "snow holiday" and employees were asked to remain at home. No traffic except big snow plows and snow removal trucks moved. It was still snowing lightly as 15 pieces of equipment manned by 100 men began the job of clearing streets in downtown Anchorage.

In a 24-hour period ending at 5 p.m. yesterday, 17.2 inches of snow fell, eclipsing the old record of 17 inches for one snow storm.

Rita's Ex-Husband Talkative at Parley

Los Angeles—(U.P.)—Producer Jerry Wald testified in federal court that actress Rita Hayworth let her ex-husband, crooner Dick Haymes, do "98 per cent of the talking" at conferences over her movie roles.

Wald testified yesterday at the trial of Miss Hayworth's \$150,000 breach of contract suit against Columbia Studios. The studio is counter-suing the actress on grounds she broke her contract with Columbia.

The actress contends the studio failed to start the picture, "Joseph and His Brethren," as scheduled. The studio charged Miss Hayworth broke the contract by not making the picture.
